THE PRESIDENT'S

On behalf of the Executive, I want to welcome you to the 15th Annual Conference of the National Federation. I trust that your deliberations may prove beneficial to your individual student bodies whom you represent and to the overall student federation. I would like to extend special greetings to our new member, Sir George Williams College, and to welcome back Queen's University, with the hope that their representatives will find some worthwhile information and projects to take back to their Student Councils.

My duties as retiring president are three fold: first, to give you new members some idea of what the National Federation stands for; secondly, to review the activities of the organization over the past term of office; and finally, to indicate the strength of the organization, its apparent weaknesses and its future goals.

N.F.C.U.S., like any other organization whose purpose is service, must have a guiding principle. Once having ascertained what this principle is, we must direct all our activities in terms of that principle. It has been long accepted that the underlying principle of the National Federation is "service to our fellow students". In other words, our entire program must be evaluated on a basis of what will be most beneficial to the Canadian University Student.

Our last Conference was held in Quebec City. The major resolutions adopted were concerned with:

1) The International scene and the forthcoming Stockholm Conference,

2) Establishment of a National Office and permanent secretary,

3) An increase in fees (six to twenty cents), 4) A N.F.C.U.S. Year Book,

5) A National Seminar, 6) Federal Aid,

7) Closer co-operation or amalgamation with I.S.S.

In addition, possible increases in our National Scholarship plans and establishment of exchange scholarships with the United States were to be investigated. This, then, was the program outlined by last year's Council to guide your Executive during its term of office. What then has been accomplished during 1951?

Immediately after the Quebec Conference preliminary steps were taken to bring N.F.C.U.S. and I.S.S. closer together. Meetings were held with their executive and a proposed Constitutional frame work drawn up. Plans for possible amalgamation were investigated by the Toronto committee but at the I.S.S. Conference in Kingston no satisfactory arrangement was agreed upon. You will be hearing a detailed report concerning this question, suffice to say, that although the ultimate goal of amalgamation was not attained the position of Canadian students in that organization has been greatly improved and an impetus was given for the union of these two bodies on the campus level.

The question of an increased fee was taken back from the Conference and accepted in principle by all member Universities. With the increased revenue the Executive were faced with the problem of finding a suitable location for the National Office and a man to fill the post of National Secretary. After considerable work on the part of Bob Johnston and through the kindness of Carleton College we have established our office in Ottawa and installed Mr. Yves Pilon in the position of Secretary. The office has been functioning since March but within this short period it has proven its worth.

The Stockholm Conference was called in December and through voluntary contributions we were able to send two members to that meeting — Mr. Denis Lazure and myself attended as your delegates. The report has been sent to the member universities regarding that Conference, and Mr. Lazure, who has been in Europe regarding that Conference, and Mr. Lazure, who has been in Europe this summer, will address you later this week. Whether or not anything tangible was accomplished in this field must be your anything tangible was accomplished in this field must be your decision, but we are pleased to report that the motions adopted at Quebec re the Stockholm Conference were presented by your delegates and received favourably.

The week before last I attended the National Congress of U.S.N.S.A. in Minneapolis for a day. On that occasion I expressed the view that the time was past for talking with the I.U.S. and that if the United States would not take action Canada would.

Again at the last Conference considerable time was spent in discussing the need for a National Seminar. The University of Montreal had done a great deal of work in organizing the proposed 1950 Seminar. At the very last moment financial assistance was refused and the plans fell through. Nonetheless the delegates at Quebec felt that such a project was of a great enough value to demand further attempts. Mr. Len Harbour and the Quebec region once again took on this work. You will be hearing from Mr. Harbour later in the Conference but let me here state that I support his actions. The committee in charge was faced with a tremendous amount of paper work in setting up such a seminar. As time wore on they realized that it would be a great gamble to attempt to collect the necessary funds for a seminar this summer. Rather than repeat the flasco of a year ago when we had students from across the country already to attend, and professors chosen, the McGill committee decided to hold off the seminar for another year. This problem was thoroughly discussed at our Executive meeting in March. It is our honest belief that with the new permanent secretariat a seminar is possible.

Much time was spent last September in discussing the need for increased publicity among University students and the public generally regarding the Federation's work and objects. Delegates felt that the publication of a Year Book would be of a real assistance. Many persons were convinced that such an enterprise was

doomed to failure due to the lack of finances and the problem of collecting necessary material. Bishop's University accepted the challenge, and have turned out a commendable issue. Those of us who have seen the book have nothing but praise for the group who were responsible for it — and this includes many university administrative officers. The Year Book question will be further discussed in commission, and the experience of Bishop's should materially aid in the publication of future issues.

In January 1950 the Federation presented a brief to the Massey Commission, outlining the need for Federal assistance in the field of higher education. In May of this year the Massey Report was tabled in the House of Commons, and among the recommendations were included those submitted by this organization. Subsequently the government has put into effect the "direct aid" portion by giving direct grants to the Universities. We must still obtain "indirect aid" in the forms of scholarships, bursaries, and loans. It is essential that this Federation continue its efforts along this line.

It would appear that this has been truly a year of accomplishment. But this accomplishment was due to more than the efforts of your member or your executive. What we finally attained in 1951 was due in great part to the arduous work of past members — to men such as Maurice Sauvé, Gordon Gwyne-Timothy, Richey Love, and many more. It was because of their vision and efforts that now, after five short years, the National Federation is becoming a real force in the field of student acitivities. It is our task to see that the work be expanded and improved.

In conclusion I want to extend my sincere thanks to those who have made this year such a success. To Bob Johnston, our Interim Secretary, to Tom Symons and Bill Turner of Toronto, to Bob Stewart and the students of Carleton College, and to all those across the Dominion who have put a great deal of energy into a generally thankless task. It has been a constant honor and pleasure to serve you as President and my only hope is that in some small way I have lived up to the tradition of that office.

Plenary Session - Tuesday, September 11th, 1951 - 11 A.M.

President Arthur V. Mauro declared the Fifteenth Annual conference of the National Federation of Canadian University Students pen for business.

He first requested the Meeting to observe a moment of silent prayer in the form of: "Each in his own words, each in his own way, for a world united in peace, bow our heads and let us pray."

The Chair then called upon Melville Platt, President of the Students' Council of the host University of Western Ontario, who welcomed the Conference to London and the University. William Hawke, local N.F.C.U.S. Chairman, outlined the various social events his Committee had planned for the entertainment of the Delegates.

Mr. Mauro greeted Queen's University back to the N.F.C.U.S., and Sir George Williams College, a new member, and expressed the hope that they would be able to take back some worthwhile information and projects to their campi. He announced a meeting of a general nature for Council Presidents, to be held at Huron College immediately following the opening banquet.

Introduction of Delegates

President Mauro introduced the Officers of the Federation, the first permanent National Secretary-Treasurer, and requested the Delegates to rise and introduce themselves.

The announcement was made that the President of the United States National Student Association, the Treasurer of the British National Union of Students, the International Secretary of the Canadian Committee of I.S.S., and the President of the New York State Region of U.S.N.S.A., would be asked to address the session later.

President's Report and Vice-President's Reports

Mr. Mauro remarked that for the first time the reports had been mimeographed and distributed this year to those in attendance; (see page 17).

Vice-Presidents J. Fricker (Ontario), L. Harbour (Quebec), and F. Scott (Western Canada), whose annual reports had been made available also, each commented briefly on the year's activities in their respective Regions. Ron Stevenson, Vice-President for the Maritimes, was unable to attend the Conference. His Report was presented and read.

Conference Publicity Arrangements

Bill Hawke, University of Western Ontario N.F.C.U.S. Chairman, in conjunction with the Secretary-Treasurer, was designated to act Press and Publicity Officers of the Conference.

Plenary Session - Tuesday, September 11th, 1951 - 2.00 P.M.

1. Appointment of Secretary-Treasurer

President Mauro reported that in March the Executive, after asking for applicants and interviewing them, had decided on Mr. J. Yves Pilon, whose appointment was now open for ratification by the Council.

MOTION (Lougheed--Coté): that the appointment of the National Secretary-Treasurer be ratified. CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY.

2. Honorarium to Past Secretary-Treasurer

It was announced that Robert D. Johnston, interim Secretary-Treasurer, had been paid \$250.00 for his services, rather than \$350.00 due for the entire year, and given an honorarium of \$50.00 at the end of his term of office instead of \$150.00.

The President expressed his satisfaction that the increase in the per capita levy from .06c to 20c, as recommended by the Fourteenth Conference, had met with the approval of the University-members, with the exception of U. B. C., who had elected to permit a 12c per capita levy subject to a possible adjustment of .08c.

Vaughan Lyon (U.B.C.) at this point announced that the 20c rate had now been approved and would be paid during the forthcoming year.

3. President's Report on Federal Aid

Chairman Art Mauro reported that the tabling of the Massey leport before Parliament in May had subsequently been followed up by chain of letters to members of Parliament using the facilities of the National Office

He felt much of the recommendations contained in the N.F.C.U.S. Brief presented to the Commission by his predecessor Richey Love, had been accepted and in fact incorporated in the final Report. The Government already has taken action in implementing this portion of the recommendations dealing with direct aid to Universities. The N.F.C.U.S. policy for the coming year should continue to bring pressure on the application of indirect aid recommendations in the form of Scholarships, Fellowships, Grants, Loans, and Bursaries. This question will be discussed at greater length in Commission I.

The President expressed his appreciation for the 50 copies of the Royal Commission Report presented to the Delegates with the compliments of our Honorary President and Commissioner himself, Révérend Georges-Henri Lévesque. He called upon the Secretary to read a message of greetings and best wishes received from Father Lévesque who was unable to be present.

4. Text Books

Graeme Ferguson read a Report on the Cost of Text Books prepared by the Toronto Committee. He explained that in submitting its findings on malpractices in the marketing of texts, the Toronto Committee had followed the same procedure it had during the year 1949-50. All Canadian Universities and many American colleges were asked to quote prices current at their campus for twenty-eight books listed for them. The replies enabled the Textbook Committee to make a conparative table of text prices for Canadian Universities. He regretted the Federal Government increase in the sales tax on books from 5% to 10% which inevitably had rendered the existing problem even more acute. There may, however, be a ray of hope for some relief to the student from the present heavy text cost burden in the recommendation of the Massey Commission that this tax on literature be discontinued.

Discussion on this subject was referred to Commission I.

MOTION - (Browns--McPhail): that the Report of the Toronto Committee on Text Books be adopted. - CARRIED.

5. Student Travel

- a) Bob Johnston reported on the 1950-51 Travel Service: 24 passages were completed and a net profit of \$120.00 in deposits was realized.
- b) A Report on the proposed expansion of the N.F.C.U.S. Overseas Travel Service was presented and read by the Secretary-Treasurer.

In summary, dealing with travel both in Canada and abroad, he said that the Provincial Tourist and Travel Bureau had indicated a keen desire to cooperate in the establishment of a travel service devoted exclusively to student traffic and that a large amount of pictorial publications were available at the National Office. He reported fresh travel contacts with B.N.U.S., U.S.N.S.A., Joint Scandinavian Travel Service (New York) and l'office du Tourisme Universitaire. He felt confident that more, and lower cost, transatlantic passages would be offered next summer and that, provided local committees were reasonaby active, a larger number of students would travel to Europe under N.F.C.U.S. auspices.

MOTION - (McGillivray--Wilson): that the Secretary's Report on Travel be accepted.

- c) Discussion on reciprocal exchanges with American Students of New York State was left to Commission I.
- d) Copies of "So You're Going to Europe" and "Alors vous allez en Europe", revised and brought up to date by Manitoba, were distributed. Frank Muldoon (Manitoba) was warmly congratulated, especially on his translation to French.

6. Quebec Summer Seminar

Len Harbour (McGill), Vice-President for Quebec Region, presented his Seminar Committee Report. The story, he said, was "one of much planning and stymie". He reported on the accomplishments of subcommittees on site, transportation, registration, patrons, professors, theme and finance; on the multitudinous details of programme, contacts, budgeting, and the printing of the Registration forms. Much time had been consumed in the endless preparations and by January 31st it was realized that if the previous year's unsuccessful attempt was to be avoided, and if Provincial Governments were to be approached, they would not be able to answer completely before March. Little time would then be left for publicity, registration, and hiring of professors. The Seminar was postponed until 1952. But representations have gone to the Governments and although few commitments have been received, it remains that the Seminar is by no means an impossibility.

MOTION - (Jordan -- Bokovay): that this Report be adopted as tabled. - CARRIED.

7. N.F.C.U.S. Year Book

Before inviting Bishop's University to present the Year Book Report, President Mauro wished the Conference to go on record as commending the Bishop's Committee very highly on their excellent accomplishment. Other participants to the debate which followed joined in the congratulations.

John Jordan (Bishop's) presented and read excerpts of Editor Reed Scowen's Report on the publication of the first Federation Year Book. It would be difficult, he said, to imagine a Canadian campus more N.F.C.U.S.-conscious than Bishop's this year, as a result of this mandate.

He suggested, for Commission discussion, a number of improvements which could be carried out in future issues as regards finance, editorial contributions, and put forth practical ideas for the benefit of the specific Committee who would undertake this project. The initial problems of a first year publication in the eyes of potential advertisers, he felt, had now been overcome, but he deplored the insufficient advertisements contracted for by University administrations which normally should be liberal and regretted "the almost complete lack of cooperation on the part of the other universities". It has been shown that the production of this Book is possible, and it is also evident that it can be published on a much larger and grander scale.

Bishop's, he concluded, "would not be as selfish as to wish to retain this most interesting assignment for a second consecutive

year, thus depriving another University from acquiring very worthwhile experience".

The University of Western Ontario volunteered to assume the responsibility for the Year Book in the coming year.

MOTION _ (Tétrault-Platt): that this Report be adopted. CARRIED.

President Mauro called the meeting adjourned for five minutes.

On calling the session to order the Chairman noted that there were occasions when the mimeographed reports not only contained a summary of what had been done by the respective Committees during the year, but also recommendations. He remarked that the reports proper were adopted and recommendations tabled for the Commissions. Only in the final Plenary Session are these recommendations either accepted or rejected. He then called upon Denis Lazure to report on International Affairs.

8. Report of the International Affairs Commission

Denis Lazure opened his remarks with a message of greetings from the I.U.S. Council which had met in Warsaw the week before, and from where he had just returned. With frequent references to his mimeo-graphed Report he proceeded to give an outline on the function, objective and aim of the I.A.C.

a) The Stockholm Conference:

The Fourteenth Conference of the National Federation of Canadian University Students had given the N.F.C.U.S. delegation specific instructions:

1 - To emphasize the principle of a decentralized international organization.

The resolution, although presented with much insistence, was not entirely accepted, as the Conference felt it was a matter of geographical regional jurisdiction to organize with full knowledge of needs and interests of particular groups within such regions.

N.F.C.U.S. subsequently initiated the move towards the establishment of a Pan American Union.

2 - The mandate concerning student relief, aid and assistance to be channelled through the facilities of W.U.S., was adopted.

3 - The third and last mission assigned to the Canadian delegation had regard to future relations with the I.U.S.-N.F.C.U.S., Lazure commented, "had resolved to adopt and follow the decision taken at Stockholm. Fortunately or unfortunately, he said, no collective stand was taken on this matter."

A motion urging National Unions represented to consider affiliation or re-affiliation with the I.U.S., was defeated.

A motion urging National Unions represented to consider ways and means of increasing cooperation with the I.U.S. and its member organizations, was tabled.

Plenary Session -- Tues., Sept. 11, 1951, 2 P.M. - Cont'd

Report of the International Affairs Comm. - Cont'd

The Report and recommendations of a Committee of six set up to examine the I.U.S. reply to the Prague thirteen points were received but not discussed.

The National Federation of Canadian University Students, continued Lazure, came out of the Stockholm Conference with three mandates; they were:

l - The responsibility to examine the possibilities of setting up a news centre in North America. This is still under study by C.U.P. as reported by Jack Gray of "The Varsity".

2 - Jointly, with the Scottish Union of Students, to investigate the possibilities of holding the next conference either on the North American continent or somewhere in Europe. The Scottish Union has since called the Conference at Edinburgh for January 3rd to 8th, 1952.

3 - Finally N.F.C.U.S. was entrusted the task to study and investigate methods of improving cooperation both between N.U's and within individual projects assigned to a group of Unions, and report its findings to the next Conference. Mr. Lazure stated that a report on this subject would be available in about a month or so.

Another major achievement of the Conference, probably the most significant, was reported to be the Students Mutual Assistance Programme (S.M.A.P.) with a number of Unions participating or undertaking to provide exchanges, relief, surveys, observe the progress of U.N.E. S.C.O., and qualified student technicians to assist underdeveloped areas.

In closing Lazure recommended the strengthening of the Federation; keep loose contacts with I.U.S. "with the hope that some day it might be possible to obtain its cooperation"; failing this, to support the establishment of an international organization whose aims and proposed activities would be practical, realistic, and in agreement with our constitution and policies.

- b) Pan-American Union: Chairman Lazure recommended to retain contacts with Brazilian, Argentinian, and Chilean Unions of Students, whose interest in the creation of a Pan-American Union is known, but warned that a majority representation should be ascertained.
- c) World University Service: Mr. Lazure reported on the General Assembly meeting held at Aas, Norway. He was pleased to note that the change in the name of this relief organization had apparently also brought about a change in student representation. Approximately half the Assembly is now composed of students.

The relief programme of W.U.S. for the coming year, he informed, was mainly directed at South-East Asia; the second major portion going to Greece and Yugoslavia; and new aid projects being initiated in the Middle East countries of Israel, Syria, Labanon, and Egypt.

It has been agreed, after much discussion, that W.U.S. would in the future accept funds from outside sources provided the grants were free from any conditions or restrictions, and provided also, that the benefactors, and philanthropists, as far as possible, would participate in the formulation and implementation of relief programmes.

He indicated that Canadian students should concern themselves with W.U.S. on the national level, and felt that:

- 1. Amalgamation with local N.F.C.U.S. Committees on each campus was a necessity.
- 2. Amalgamation on the national level was not recommendable at the present time.
- 3. Larger and stronger student participation on the W.U.S. national and administrative Committees.

"The W.U.S. is for the time being the most suitable organization and my recommendation is to keep on channelling our relief work through this international service".

On motion the Meeting was adjourned until Wednesday morning.

Plenary Session - Wednesday, September 12th, 1951 - 9.30 A.M.

The Meeting was called to order and Dr. Oskar F. Bock, Director of the Austrian Student Goodwill Tour, was invited to say a few words.

Or. Bock expressed great pleasure in attending the N.F.C.U.S. Conference and considered it a privilege to be permitted to address this student convention. He gave a brief account of the origin and development of the Austrian group and showed the close ties with similar British troupes. He stated their principal aim was cultural and educational and that they manage to raise at least two-thirds of their required budget on a tour, with the other third contributed by sponsors. He was confident that students of Canada would make possible a consecutive tour of Canadian campi during the coming winter season. He went on to thank American and Canadian people for their support and kindness and asked for their continued assistance and understanding of the European students' problems.

President Mauro thanked Dr. Bock for his message of goodwill and called upon the I.A.C. Chairman to complete his report.

d) <u>IIIrd World Peace Festival</u> --International University Summer Games - Berlin.

Denis Lazure commended the cultural aspect of the programme as one of high calibre but deplored the political influence manifested which definitely had a psychological effect on the theme of the Festival. He wished the Conference would take strong exception to the political manifestations demonstrated at the Berlin Festival.

Reporting on the Summer Games, he first regretted the fact that they coincided with the Festival proper. He summarized the elaborate facilities provided by the German Government and commented on the many athletic records which in some cases even surpassed those of the last Olympic Games.

Some of the Western National Unions, he asserted, had failed to participate in the Games for fear of becoming involved in the political aspect of the Festival. He assured that the Games were free from partisanship, prejudices and political implications and that

sports was one field in which students of the world can reach agreement. He then recommended the creation of a National Sports coordinating and selection Committee as a first step towards our participation in competitions on an international scale.

e) I.U.S. Council Meeting - Warsaw

Mr. Lazure first remarked he had attended this meeting as an observer with no specific mandate. He reported favourably on the new I.U.S. policy with regard to Western Unions of Students and commented on the possibility of re-opening negotiations with the I.U.S. He warned, however, that this would constitute our last attempt and that he would recommend the formation of a new international students' body should our efforts for more active participation fail.

He had taken the liberty to extend an invitation to the I.U.S. President, Joseph Grohman, and to a delegation of Soviet students to visit Canada during the coming academic year. Both invitations had been accepted and in fact reciprocated. He explained a similar exchange had taken place last year between B.N.U.S. and the Russian students. The matter was now placed before the Conference for consideration.

10. Greetings from U.S.N.S.A.

The President introduced Mr. Bill Dentzer, President of the United States National Student Association.

Mr. Dentzer brought greetings from American students and stated they were looking forward to increased cooperation between our two unions. The U.S.N.S.A., he said, had resolved to push the results of the Stockholm Conference in every way, to support the establishment of new international organization, and foremost, an international secretariate. He expressed the hope that the Stockholm and the Edinburgh Conferences would make a possible change in international student affairs.

President Mauro, after declaring the Session open, introduced Mrs. Greta Riddel-Dixon, International Secretary of the Canadian Committee of I.S.S.

- 1. Mrs. Dixon commended the cooperation they had had from N.F.C.U.S. and expressed appreciation that two representatives had been appointed to sit on the Administrative Committee of I.S.S. She then invited N.F.C.U.S. participation to the I.S.S. National Conference at McMaster University on October 20-21. Mrs. Dixon went on with an outline of relief activities in Greece, Yugoslavia, and particularly South Asian countries, by supplying equipment and drugs, and concluded with hopes of closer relationship with N.F.C.U.S.
 - 2. Presentation of Commission Reports.

Plenary Session - Friday, September 14th, 1951 9.30 - 12.00 A.M., and 12.30 - 7.05 P.M.

The President declared the session open and called upon Mr. A. John Harrison, B.N.U.S. Honorary Treasurer and Travel representative in New York City.

Mr. Harrison was pleased to note that Commission V. was recommending the establishment of a Travel Bureau at the National Office, and thought this would give rise to better cooperation and understanding. He pointed to a number of technicalities concerning travel and booking systems for sea, land and air travel, and envisioned within a couple of years the establishment of a more permanent section with staff that would not increase the cost of student travel. and I stand ready to help you all we can".

Election of Officers

Commission I recommended we re-affirm our stand that no Canadian should be prevented by financial need from completing his education and felt it was more important than ever for the Federal Government to establish a comprehensive scheme of scholarships, bursaries and student loans. It re-affirms, too, our belief that education must remain within the field of previncial jurisdiction and that no action be taken which might prejudice the present system.

MOTION - (U. B. C. --Manitoba): that the N.F.C.U.S. go on record as strenuously opposing the recent rises in University Fees on Canadian Campi and that the University of British Columbia be mandated to inaugurate a National Campaign toward the reduction of such Fees.

- ii) THAT sponsorship of a Week of N.F.C.U.S. Activities on the campi be left to the discretion of Local Committees.
- iii) THAT a Mandate be given to Toronto to investigate the possibility of securing a National Radio Programme for the N.F.C.U.S., preferably celebrating National Student Day.

E. N.F.C.U.S. YEAR_ROUND PUBLICITY

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Canadian University Press National Executive as follows:

News Releases -

THAT regular, preferably weekly, news releases be sent out from the office of the N.F.C.U.S. Secretary to Editors of all student papers.

THAT news of events of more than routine importance be released to the CUP Wire Service through the facilities of "The Carleton", Carleton College, Ottawa.

Annual Conference

THAT two Observers from CUP be accredited by the N.F.C.U.S. to its Annual Conference, primarily for the purpose of reporting the Conference.

THAT a copy of the Report of the Annual Conference be sent to all Editors.

NFCUS Executive Meetings -

THAT the Secretary send advance notice to the student paper at the University at which an Executive Meeting is to be held so that the paper may make arrangements to cover the Meeting.

THAT complete process privileges be accorded that paper at

THAT complete press privileges be accorded that paper at the Meeting.

THAT the Secretary's Report of Executive Meetings be sent to all Editors.

Local Committees

THAT each NFCUS Committee establish a definite liaison with the student newspaper at its campus.

THAT in the event that a Local Committee sends a circular letter of any news value to all other NFCUS Committees a copy be sent to all Editors.

P. NATIONAL AFFAIRS

Discussion:

The Toronto delegate advocated this addition to the Agenda on the basis of a desire to strengthen N.F.C.U.S. on the administration level. Discussion centred around the possibilities of setting up an Advisory Board or Council consisting of Government, business, or past N.F.C.U.S. officials.

Report of Commission III - Cont'd

National Affairs - (Cont'd)

MOTION - (Manitoba-Dalhousie): that the National Executive prepare a slate of Honorary Vice-Presidents who will be prepared to serve in an advisory capacity to the Federation, which slate should be presented at the end of the Annual Conference.

CARRIED.

G. ADDITIONAL PUBLICATIONS

Considering Reed Scowen's recommendation number Two in the Year Book Report, the Commission discussed at some length various possibilities.

MOTION - (Toronto-Manitoba): that Toronto accept the responsibility of compiling a Brief on living conditions, general Tuition and Text costs, the opportunity for Scholarships and Bursaries for all institutions of Higher Learning in Ontario, and this Brief to be distributed to all Secondary Schools in Ontario to further the equality of opportunity for education.

CARRIED.

It was pointed out that this project was experimental in nature and may later be applied on a National scale.

REPORT OF COMMISSION IV

(As approved in Plenary Session)

Chairman - Denis Lazure

PREAMBLE

Great interest was shown by the many delegates and observers who attended the two long meetings of this Commission.

Due to the important developments that took place during the past year on the student international scene, especially referring to the Stockholm conference, and the recent I.U.S. Council Meeting, it was felt by this Commission that N.F.C.U.S. should formulate at this Conference a very clear policy on its future contribution to the international student movement.

It is with this decisive and clear state of mind that the Commission dealt conscienciously with the numerous items of the Agenda and took the following decisions that we respectfully submit to the Plenary Session.

A. SUB_COMMITTEE ON PEACE

The Commission felt that clarification and re-definition of our understanding of the ideal of peace is an integral factor of the future policy of the I.A.C. A sub-committee consisting of Taylor (McGill), Wax (Toronto), and Desgagne (Laval, was nominated to draft a resolution on peace which would define our position. This committee presented the following resolution:

Resolved:

THAT the students of Canada realize that the path of future progress on the international scene is only possible within the framework of international peace.

We therefore join with the students across the world in a sincere desire for peace. We deplore, however, all forms of peace offers based on propaganda to further political aims.

The students of Canada can best contribute to world peace by a programme of action which brings students of the world into closer relationship and understanding and further by a programme of concrete aid to raise the standards of living and study of our fellow students in all parts of the world without regard to race, colour or creed.

B. STUDENT OFFICE in UNESCO HEADQUARTERS

Whereas an office has been established as a branch of the youth section in charge of student problems within U.N.E.S.C.O.

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Report of Commission IV - Cont'd

Student Office in UNESCO Headquarters (Cont'd)

The Commission resolved that the Federation be urged to use this channel to keep informed on international projects that would be of interest to Canadian students.

C. NATIONAL UNESCO COMMISSION

Recommendation:

THAT the Secretary-Treasurer be instructed to contact the sub-committee of the Department of External Affairs, who act as a National U.N.E.S.C.O. Commission, in order to keep informed of National projects and opportunities of interest to students.

D. PAN_AMERICAN UNION

Resolved:

THAT a Mandate be given to the new I.A.C. to maintain contacts established by this year's Commission in order to realize a Pan-American Union as soon as possible.

E. W.U.S. ASSEMBLY, and RELATIONS with I.S.S.

Recommendations:

- i) THAT campi across Canada should study the setting up of External Affairs Departments of their student governments to facilitate the co-operation of both NFCUS and ISS local Committees.
- 1i) THAT the National Office be made responsible for the accumulation and distribution of the data on External Affairs Departments from those Universities which already have them.
- iii) THAT the National Executive do all in its power to maintain close co-operation with I.S.S., and that it make any proposals with regard to the structure of both organizations to facilitate such co-operation.

F. BERLIN FESTIVAL

The Commission was unanimous in its disapproval of the political aspects of the programme carried out at the Berlin Festival, and

Resolved

THAT the N.F.C.U.S. views with alarm and regret the manner in which the Berlin Festival was conducted and the linking of I.U.S. with biased propaganda and political activity.

<u>MOTION</u> - (<u>Manitoba--Western</u>): that it is the view of this Convention we should forward a strong protest to the I.U.S.; this disapproval should be communicated to the I.U.S. Exectuive by the National Secretary.
CARRIED.

Report of Commission IV - Cont'd

Berlin Festival - (Cont'd)

MOTION - (McGill--Saskatchewan): that the N.F.C.U.S. should officially dissociate itself from Canadian students participating as Delegates in this Festival.

CARRIED.

G. I.U.S. UNIVERSITY SUMMER GAMES

The Commission agreed in principle that we send students to participate in organized sports competitions provided we have organized this participation on a national basis.

Resolved:

THAT this Commission favours sending a Canadian student athletic delegation to the Czech Regional Winter Games provided the results of the I.U.S. Meeting and the Edinburgh Conference indicate closer relations leading to affiliation with I.U.S. However, it is to be understood that this recommendation must not entail any financial responsibility or obligation for N.F.C.U.S.

H. I.U.S. COUNCIL

After considerable discussion of the difficulties involved in any relations with the I.U.S., the Commission was divided as to the desirability of committing the N.F.C.U.S. to the proposed meeting of the I.U.S. Executive with Western National Student Unions not affiliated with the I.U.S. Lack of good faith shown by I.U.S. in biased and perverted news accounts, as well as the feeling that their recent overtures were designed to cripple concrete results of the Stockholm Conference by raising false hopes in the Western Unions for a reformed truly democratic I.U.S., were the reasons for the split. Nevertheless, the urgency of the situation demanded a positive stand.

Resolved:

THAT the N.F.C.U.S. agree to send a Delegation to the proposed joint meeting of the I.U.S. Executive with Western Unions not affiliated with I.U.S.

Resolved:

THAT the Delegation of this proposed meeting shall bring with them requests for specific changes in the I.U.S. policy and that refusal of these requests be considered the termination of our co-operation with I.U.S.

A resolution recommending that N.F.C.U.S. sponsor the proposed meeting jointly with the other Western Unions and the I.U.S. was defeated in Plenary Session.

A sub-committee made up of Wax (Toronto), Lazure (I.A.C. Chairman), and Desgagné (Laval), was nominated to formulate these requests.

believes it is necessary and desirable that there should be established relationships between itself and students throughout the rest of the world.

Since the I.U.S. already exists on the international student scene and by virtue of its international nature we deem it desirable to achieve a maximal degree of relationship with the students of the world through the I.U.S.

To achieve this end we call upon the I.U.S. Exexcutive Committee to carefully consider the following points with a view to remedying the growing dissatisfaction of Canadian students with the programme and policies of the I.U.S.

If all these points are not met at the meeting arranged between the I.U.S. Executive Committee and the non-I.U.S. student unions in a manner consistent with the resolutions submitted then it is the intention of the Canadian body to withdraw from all active participation in the I.U.S. and to seek the establishment of some international student organization which may fulfill these needs.

Resolutions:

1. National Constitutional Autonomy.

Constitution -- Acceptance and abidance with the I.U.S. Constitution only in accordance with the constitution and policy of the National Federation of Canadian University Students (N.F.C.U.S.)

2. Interpretation of I.U.S. Constitution

- (a) Secretariat -- The Secretariat of the I.U.S. shall reflect in its activities and function the directives and decisions of the representative governing bodies. The Secretariat shall in no way formulate policy independent of the general body. The Secretariat should consist of a more representative basis sufficiently broad to include a representative number of national student representatives.
- (b) Political Discrimination -- The I.U.S. shall not exclude from its organization any national union on grounds of political belief, colour, race or creed.
- (c) Minority Opinion -- The I.U.S. shall govern its procedure in a democratic manner so that its actions will reflect the will of the majority of its members. In an equally democratic manner the rights of the minorities shall be respected and preserved. Further, the manner of formulating majority opinion shall be done with regard to standard and open methods of procedure regarding motions, voting, freedom of speech and recognition of minority opinion.
- (d) Membership All duly recognised representative student unions shall have the right to belong to the I.U.S. In those countries where no national union of students exists the I.U.S. may recognize a representative national co-ordinating committee for a limited time until a permanent structure is created. Minority groups from countries having neither national student unions or provisional co-ordinating committees shall not have the right to be represented on the I.U.S. and shall not be allowed to sit on governing bodies of the I.U.S. or be given the status of full delegates.

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Report of Commission IV - Cont'd

I.U.S. Council - Resolutions of the Committee.... (Cont'd)

Resolutions:

- 3. International Policy with respect to I.U.S. Activities
- (a) Publicity and Information -- The publications and news services of the I.U.S. must reflect the international character of its membership. A fair proportion of news coverage and information must be devoted to those students living in South-East Asia, Africa, and North and South America. Care must be taken to avoid a form of reporting biassed to certain segments of the world student body.
- (b) Student Relief -- We view with alarm the division and growing conflicts between international bodies engaged in world student relief projects. To avoid duplication of services with consequent waste of student funds and to avoid future unnecessary conflicts we call upon the I.U.S. to seek a closer understanding and co-operation between the International Student Organization and the World University Service.
- (c) Mandates -- We call upon the I.U.S. to decentralize its activities and that responsibility for its programme should be allotted through clear and concise mandates to national member student unions throughout the world. In this way student unions throughout the world may participate directly in the affairs of I.U.S. and feel that by their activities they have some measure of direct participation in the affairs of I.U.S.
- (d) Ideological Differences -- The international student body is drawn together by virtue of common needs which rise above the barriers of national and ideological differences. The I.U.S. shall not subordinate or discriminate in any part of its programme against member organizations because of varying or differing ideological background.
- (e) Political Problems -- The I.U.S. as an International Student Body concerned solely with student activities shall refrain from taking sides on major political problems which properly fall within the competence of the U.N.O.

All political action of the I.U.S. must confine itself to the principle that whenever the I.U.S. council or its executive committee establishes to its satisfaction that conditions prevailing in any country limit the social, academic, cultural or material freedom of students, it shall consider itself obliged as an International Union to act against such conditions, and to call upon its constituents to support such acts.

AUSTRIAN STUDENT GOODWILL TOUR

Resolved: THAT this Commission supports the purpose of the Austrian Student Goodwill Tour, and recommends that each local N.F.C.U.S. Committee, in co-operation with local I.S.S. Committees, and any other interested organizations, sponsor this scheme on individual campi, provided no financial obligation on the N.F.C.U.S. Budget, as passed in this Annual Meeting, is involved.

policy to be specified in mandate adopted by the Plenary Session. In accordance with this policy the following resolutions were passed. Resolved: THAT the N.F.C.U.S. Conference send a Delegation to the Edinburgh Conference which will be governed by the success or failure of the Meeting between I.U.S. Executive Committee and non-affiliated National Student Unions. Resolved: i) THAT in case of the failure of the Meeting between the I.U.S. Executive Committee and non-affiliated National Student Unions to come to an agreement, that we favour the establishment of an International organization as soon as possible which would be apolitical in character, and which would include all representative National Student Unions of the world. ii) THAT the delegation sent to the Edinburgh Conference by N.F.C.U.S. be given a Mandate to set up, and if necessary take the initiative in setting up, a Secretariat which would work toward the achievement of the programmes laid down by the Stockholm and Edinburgh Conferences. J. INVITATIONS to FOREIGN STUDENTS The Commission was divided in its opinion of Mr. Lazure's invitations to the Soviet delegation and to the President of the I.U.S. to visit Canada. Some of the members opposed the proposed visit on financial grounds, others on the ground of the dubious reception which such a group might meet on some Canadian campi. However, a compromise was reached, and it was MOVED by Toronto (Wax), and SECONDED by McGill (Tétrault): THAT the N.F.C.U.S., in co-operation with interested groups, attempt to bring a Delegation of South Asian students CARRIED. to Canada. Note -- The I.S.S. Canadian Committee, at its National Conference held at McMaster University on October 20-21,1951, has agreed to co-operate in the implementation of the foregoing resolution. BROADENING of I. A. C. THAT this Commission recommend to the Plenary Session Resolved: that in order that views and feelings within the I.A.C. should be more representative of student opinion, two Vice-Chairmen be nominated in the Plenary Session of the Annual Conference, who would be selected from different regions, and who would act in an advisory capacity to the Chairman of I.A.C. However, the Chairman of I.A.C. would be Mandated to form his Commission on his own campus.

The Commission agreed on the principle of a positive

MOTION - (Dalhousie-Sir George Williams): that we ask Toronto to accept, for the forthcoming year, the I.A.C. mandate.

CARRIED.

K. FOURTH CONGRESS of U.S.N.S.A.

The Commission agreed to forward a statement of principle that we co-operate to the utmost with U.S.N.S.A. because of our common interests. The Commission received the results of the U.S.A. Congress with great interest and out of the Congress it seems evident that the co-operation between our two organizations should increase to a maximum degree.

New York State Region:

I.A.C. is grateful to N.Y.S.R. for the interest and practical proposals that they have brought to the N.F.C.U.S. It is felt that the proposed exchanges between American and Canadian students deserve and should be given full support by the N.F.C.U.S.

A. AUSTRIAN STUDENT GOODWILL TOUR

Resolved:

THAT the National Federation of Canadian University Students take an active interest in the promotion of the Austrian Student Goodwill Tour.

B. TOURING SPEAKERS

Resolved:

THAT the N.F.C.U.S. participation in sponsoring touring speakers is neither feasible nor necessary because of the high guarantee cost and facilities which now exist in most Universities.

C. TRAVEL SERVICE

Recommendations:

- 1) THAT a central Students' Travel Bureau be established in the National Office embodying the suggestions of the Secretary-Treasurer's Report.
- ii) THAT information from the Travel Agency be in the hands of the Local N.F.C.U.S. Committee and University papers by the 1st of January, or as soon thereafter as feasible.
- iii) THAT the Travel Bureau should solicit the help of the B.N.U.S. and U.S.N.S.A.

D. CANADIAN UNIVERSITY DEBATING ASSOCIATION

Resolved:

i) THAT the expenses of the National Debating Finals be distributed as follows: those universities whose enrolment is over 1,000 pay \$40.00 of the estimated total cost, and those under 1,000 pay \$15.00 of the total cost, payable in advance by December 15th, it being left to each League to collect this amount and distribute as it sees fit, with adjustment to be made later on the basis of 1/18th for those over 1,000 and 1/48th for those under 1,000, by Mar.15th.

MOTION - (McMaster-Saskatchewan): that Dalhousie look into the Constitution of C.U.D.A. and report to the Executive Meeting in November. CARRIED.

MOTION - (Loyola-Acadia): that Dalhousie be empowered to draft a new Constitution. CARRIED

THAT when this new Constitution comes before the Executive in November they are empowered either to pass it or reject it, subject to ratification of the next annual conference.

- ii) THAT an honorarium be given to the Chairman of the National Debating Finals.
- iii) THAT the expenses of the 1950-51 Debating League Finals be divided according to the Constitution in force at that time and that I.U.D.L. pay their share.
 - iv) THAT the General Secretary with the Chairman shall obtain a National Debating Trophy for the organization.
 - v) THAT the Debating Finals be held in Ottawa this year.
 - vi) THAT Chief Justice Rinfret of the Supreme Court of Canada be named as the Honorary President of C.U.D.A., and in the event that he is unable to accept, the Speaker of the House of Commons be asked.

A MOTION by Bishop's and Alberta, commending the high standard of work that has been done by Bob Johnston and Louis Desbiens on the C.U.D.A. Constitution, CARRIED Unanimously.

E. NATIONAL DRAMA FESTIVAL

Resolved:

THAT those Universities who find it financially possible should participate in the Dominion Drama Festival.

MOTION - (McGill-- U. N. B.): that a National University

Drama Festival, organized by the N.F.C.U.S., at this time
is not feasible.

CARRIED.

F. PURCHASE CARD SYSTEM

Resolved:

THAT the National Committee on the Purchase Card System be disbanded and that future work be continued on the local level.

G. ROYALTIES

Resolved:

THAT a local Committee be appointed to investigate the possibility of obtaining reduction on royalties on all stage productions.

MOTION - (Saskatchewan-Sir George Williams): that the Comittee at McMaster accept the foregoing mandate. CARRIED.

H. INFORMATION CENTRE

Resolved:

THAT the National Office establish itself as a centre for the exchange of information between the various universities and keep on file information on student constitutions, hand books, financial and athletic set-ups, etc.

I. NATIONAL SPORTS COMMISSION

Resolved:

THAT not only is a National Sports organization financially impossible, but as long as national competition is being held independent of N.F.C.U.S. it is unnecessary that a permanent committee be set up under this organization.

MOTION - (Bishop's-Loyola): that the N.F.C.U.S. Executive be mandated to contact the main University Sports organizations of the country with a view of suggesting to them the creation of a National University Sports Commission which would have competence to determine National champions that could represent Canadian students in international competitions.

CARRIED.

J. HISTORY of N.F.C.U.S.

Following short explanatory remarks by Chairman Scott, it was generally agreed the NFCUS History should be brought up-to-date.

MOTION - (Manitoba-Loyola): that Ottawa be appointed, in conjunction with the Secretary-Treasurer, to prepare a History of the National Federation of Canadian University Students:

CARRIED.

(43) CONSTITUTION and BY_LAWS OF THE NATIONAL FEDERATION OF CANADIAN UNIVERSITY STUDENTS Amended to August 31, 1951 (For amendments recommended by the 1951 Conference, see pages 27-29 of this report. According to Article XII of the Constitution, these amendments require ratification by at least two-thirds of the constitutent members within 75 days after the beginning of the NFCUS FISCAL YEAR. After November 15, 1951, silence will be interpreted to indicate approval.) ARTICLE I _ NAME This organization shall be known as the National Federation (1) of Canadian University Students. Its short title shall be the N.F.C.U.S. ARTICLE II _ OBJECT To promote in every way possible a better understanding among (1) all Canadian University students, a greater degree of co-operation and correlation among all Canadian Universities for the effective promotion of student interests and to provide a means for developing international relationships with student groups in other countries. ARTICLE III - LANGUAGE French and English shall be the official languages of the Federation. ARTICLE IV - RELIGION and POLITICS The N.F.C.U.S. shall be neutral in political and religious (1) matters and shall take no stand on such matters. ARTICLE V _ MEMBERSHIP Membership shall be open to the representative student or-(1) ganization of each University in the Dominion of Canada. A university shall be defined as "a chartered institution granting degrees subsequent to matriculation". (A Student Council or similar functioning student body shall be deemed a representative student organization. Any institution which does not conform with the above definition (2) of a University may be admitted to membership by a majority vote of the Executive Council in plenary session. In special cases, subject to the discretion of the Executive (3) Council, membership shall be open to representative student organizations within Universities or University colleges not affiliated as a whole.

(44) CONSTITUTION and BY_LAWS: (Continued) (4) Every Canadian University student paying student government fees in each University whose representative student organization is a member of the National Federation of Canadian University Students shall be, ipso facto, a member of the Federation. (5) The Executive Council at the Annual Meeting shall have power to elect associated members who shall pay no fees, have no vote, and shall receive none of the material benefits from the N.F.C.U.S. ARTICLE VI - ADMINISTRATION (1) The Administration of the Federation shall be in the hands of an executive council consisting of two official delegates and two Cficial observers from each member University appointed annually by the constituent organizations, who shall be members of the constituent organizations. (2) The Executive Council shall have power to make all arrangements and appoint sub-committees necessary for carrying into effect the aims and objects of the Federation as set forth in the Constitution and shall for this purpose have power to pass the necessary by-laws. ARTICLE VII _ OFFICERS (1) The Officers of the Federation shall be: An Honorary President: As many Honorary Vice-Presidents as may be selected at the Annual Meeting: A President: Four Vice-Presidents: One to represent the Maritimes One to represent Quebec One to represent Ontario One to represent the Universities of Western Canada. (One of these Vice-Presidents shall be designated First Vice-President.) A Secretary-Treasurer. (2) The President and Four Vice-Presidents shall be elected from among the members present and by the members of the Executive Council at the Annual Meeting. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein, these officers shall be deemed to be members of the Federation until the conclusion of their term of office. Nominations shall be handed in from the floor at any time before the election. Upon the acceptance of nomination, the past administrative record of the nominee for an elective office of the Federation shall be presented in a factual and Objective manner by the nominator.

If a candidate wishes to refuse his candidature, he must (4) do so before nominations close. The election of the President shall be held first. (5) Nominations for the offices of Vice-President shall be (6) handed in by any constituent member but only the member universities in the respective regions shall have a vote. In case of a tie vote, a second ballot of all constituent members shall be taken. These officers shall hold office from the end of the (7) Annual Meeting or Biennial Meeting at which they have been elected until the end of the next meeting, and in no case shall they hold office for more than two years. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be appointed by the Executive (8) Council at the Annual Meeting. He need not be a member of the Executive Council and shall hold office at their pleasure, He shall be, during his term of office, a member of the Federation, and may be granted an annual honorarium. ARTICLE VIII - DUTIES of OFFICERS The President of the Federation shall preside at the Annual (1) Meeting of the Executive Council. He shall be responsible, together with the four Vice-Presidents and Secretary-Treasurer, for the administration and conduct of all business arising from the Annual Meeting and such other business as may arise between Annual Meetings. (2) Duties of Vice-Presidents To convene and preside at regional conferences. To collate the opinions, suggestions and inquiries of the universities within their regions, and present them at the meeting of officers of the Federation. To report to the universities within their regions on matters discussed at meetings of officers of the Federation. To carry out such additional specific duties as may be allotted to them by the President. To be directly responsible to the President for the co-ordination of the activities of the local NFCUS Committees in their regions and for the completion of their Annual assignments. (3) At the end of every N.F.C.U.S. Annual Meeting, a full report of Committee proceedings and resolutions shall be forwarded to all delegates within three weeks of the end of the Annual Meeting, and the Secretary-Treasurer shall ensure the publication of a summarized report of the proceedings in all Canadian University newspapers.

- (3) Cont'd The Secretary-Treasurer shall be responsible for all routine business. He shall keep the books of the Federation, the minutes of the Annual Meetings, and the reports of such Committees as may from time to time be set up by the Executive Council. He shall be required to submit a budget for the succeeding year at each Annual Meeting and an Audit of the Federation finances at the close of each financial year and at such other times as may be required by the Executive Council.
- (4) The Honorary Officers of the Federation shall form an advisory body to the Executive Council.
- (5) If an Officer resigns for any reason; a) If he is the President, the 1st Vice-President shall take over office as President and his successor as Regional Vice-President shall be elected by the member Universities of his region.

b) If he is a Vice-President, his successor shall be elected by the member Universities of his region.

c) If he is the Secretary-Treasurer, the Executive will appoint a new Secretary-Treasurer and pay him on a pro rata basis.

ARTICLE IX - FINANCES

- A schedule of fees for membership in N.F.C.U.S. shall be (1)established by the Executive Council at its Annual Meeting in accordance with current budget requirements. Usually the fees shall contain the following two elements:
 - a) a fixed membership fee for each representative student organization;
 - b) a per capita levy based on the number of students paying student organization fees to the constituent members.
- The Federation shall be responsible for the expenses of the (2) official representatives to the Annual Meeting and for such operating expenses as are required by the Constitution. Any decision taken to exceed the budget as authorized in Plenary Session of the Executive Council shall only be valid upon approval of a four-fifth majority of the elected officers of the Federation, exclusive of Honorary Officers
- The fiscal year shall end on the last day of the month pre-(3) ceding the Annual National Conference. The budget, including the per capita levy as passed by the Annual Meeting or Biennial Meeting, shall be ratified by the constituent organizations seventy-five days after the beginning of the fiscal year.

(47) CONSTITUTION and BY_LAWS: (Continued) ARTICLE X _ MEETINGS The Executive Council shall meet annually during the (1) Christmas vacation or at such other time, and at such place as shall be decided by the officers of the Federation. The meetings of the Executive Council may be attended by (2) unofficial delegates of the various members of the council or invitees of the Executive Council: they shall have no voting power. ARTICLE XI _ QUORUM A quorum of the Executive Council shall consist of the (1)official representatives of two-thirds of the total number of constituent organizations. In plenary sessions of the Annual Conference the following (2) voting procedure shall apply: (a) Each member university shall be allowed but one vote; The vote of each member university shall be cast by the president of constituent organization which he represents as a delegate to the conference; In the event of the absence of the president from the (c) Plenary Session, but where the president is present at the conference as an accredited delegate, the vote may be cast by the other delegate representing the same constituent organization; In the event of the absence of the president from the (a) conference, or if the president is not an accredited delegate to the conference, the vote shall then be cast by the chairman of each delegation as appointed by the constituent organization of each member university, provided such chairman has the status of delegate; In no instance shall the vote of each member university (e) be recognized where the person casting such vote has a status other than that of delegate; The case of a tie vote in the Plenary Session, the (f) chairman may exercise a deciding vote. In meetings of Commissions of the Annual Conference, the (3) following voting procedure shall apply: Each accredited delegate and accredited observer present at the commission meeting shall be entitled to one vote. Unofficial observers shall not have the right to vote. (b) In the case of a tie vote at the meeting the chairman (c) shall cast the deciding vote.

(48) CONSTITUTION and BY_LAWS: (Continued) ARTICLE XII - AMENDMENTS (1) Amendments to this constitution, before becoming effective, shall be passed by a majority of the Executive Council at the annual meeting and be ratified by at least two-thirds of the constituent members within seventy-five (75) days after the beginning of the N.F.C.U.S. FISCAL YEAR. N.F.C.U.S. BY - LAWS The Secretary-Treasurer shall prepare the provisional (1) agenda for the Annual Meeting and shall give all Canadian Universities at least thirty days' notice of such meeting. He shall forward the agenda with the notice of meeting. The travelling expenses of the officers and official re-(2) presentatives to the Annual Meeting shall be paid from general funds. All constituent organizations shall, immediately upon (3) election of their new official representative to the Executive Council, notify the Secretary of the Federation. On the request of a constituent member, French and English (4) shall be the means of communication in all correspondence and at all meetings. No decision of the Executive Council of the N.F.C.U.S. (5) shall be binding on a constituent member when the said decision is contrary to the regulations of the said constituent member. During the period of financial stress the Council may sub-(6) stitute a biennial meeting of the Executive Council in place of an annual meeting. The facilities of the N.F.C.U.S. and its organization may (7)be utilized for the purpose of holding regional or Dominionwide conferences of university students upon the consent being received of the majority of the members of the Executive Council. Delegates to the Regional Conferences shall be appointed by the students' councils of member universities in the region, and Regional Conferences shall

(7) - Continued:

be empowered to administer their decisions insofar as they pertain to their own regions, and a report of their decisions shall be submitted to the constituent members of N.F.C.U.S. through the Secretary-Treasurer at the conclusion of the Regional Conference.

- (5) No opinion on national affairs reflecting upon the constituent members shall be voiced by the officers of the Federation without the unanimous approval of the constituent members.
- (9) The Secretary-Treasurer shall supply a satisfactory fidelity bond at the expense of the Federation.
- (10) When the question of finance and budget are being discussed at the annual meeting of the Executive Council, the President and Secretary-Treasurer shall sit with the appropriate commission.
- (11) Cushing's Manual of Parliamentary Practice shall be used to govern meetings of the N.F.C.U.S.


