ACCESSIBILITY ISSUES FOR DISABLED STUDENTS

Students with disabilities often require special accommodations to provide for physical access and access to the course materials in order to compete equally with the rest of the student population. The disabilities can include mobility, sensory (hearing and visual), neurological, mental, emotional and learning impairments.

The following recommendations have been generated by NEADS (National Educational Association of Disabled Students and BCEADS (British Columbia Educational Association of Disabled Students). The purpose of the recommendations is to encourage the Canadian Federation of Students to actively promote accessibility for those students who have disabilities.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the Canadian Federation of Students, and its provincial affiliates recognize the need for greater physical accessibility to buildings and classrooms for disabled students, and to that end lobby for increased accessibility in colleges/universities at all levels.
- 2. That offices of the Canadian Federation of Students and affiliates be physically accessible as a model for change.
- 3. That student governments be encouraged to hold "awareness activities" on post-secondary campuses, with the prime organizers of these events to be disabled students and their clubs/groups.
- 4. That members include disabled students in their delegations at Canadian Federation of Students' meetings and provincial meetings.
- 5. That all workshop sites, committee/regional caucus/commission meetings, plenaries and meals at conferences be held in physically accessible locations.
- 6. That special services be offered when necessary (interpreters, note takers, readers).
- 7. That delegate packages for conferences include information on accessibility to conference and accommodation sites.
- 8. That the Canadian Federation of Students and provincial affiliates encourage the creation of disabled students' organizations.

- 9. That disabled students' organizations be encouraged to become members of the Provincial and National Educational Associations of Disabled Students.
- 10. That the Canadian Federation of Students encourage colleges and universities to hire full-time coordinators of disabled student services to meet the requirements of the disabled student population.
- 11. That the Canadian Federation of Students and provincial affiliates lobby with NEADS to improve types of financial assistance available to disabled students.
- 12. That the Canadian Federation of Students lobby with NEADS to promote flexible financial assistance to allow disabled students to attend part-time and purchase necessary equipment.
- 13. That the Canadian Federation of Students and provincial affiliates lobby with NEADS to encourage all provincial Ministries of Education, and Ministries of Colleges and Universities to hire staff persons to address disabled students' issues, and act as a liaison between the disabled community, students, and their organizations, colleges and universities, and government.
- 14. That Canadian Federation of Students share information on its activities with provincial and National Associations of disabled students.
- 15. That the Canadian Federation of Students recognize that disabled students often require special equipment (TDD telephone, tape recorders, brailler, special computer adaptations).
- 16. That the Canadian Federation of Students promote the use of peers in meeting the needs of disabled students.
- 17. That the Canadian Federation of Students encourage post secondary institutions to develop a philosophy that promotes access, services, and programs for disabled adults.

Be it the rights of students with disabilities, indigenous students, the rights of gay and lesbian students, womens rights, childcare, part-time students, labour disputes, international issues and students who use trains, planes and buses, the committee led the way for progressive thought within the federation. We also found ourselves embroiled in the on going debate of what is termed the "educational vs noneducational issue".

Whereas, there exists a general lack of awareness amongst the peoples of the world with regard to these violations, and

Whereas, Canadian students have the opportunity to influence this situation and

Whereas, the United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organization has expressed its willingness to sponsor the establishment of a centre for monitoring student and academic rights;

BIRT the CFS involve itself in the discussions surrounding the initiative of the International Union of Students to establish a centre for monitoring student and academic rights.

SR 7 Windsor/Ryerson (Notice of Policy)

Whereas the federation recognizes the importance of having an alternative speaker list so as to facilitate participation on behalf of women members so as to reduce gender inequalities;

BIRT an alternative speakers list be instated for indigenous people with gender choices first and ethnicity second so as to facilitate participation on behalf of the indigenous members of the federation.

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SR 8 Brock/Mount Saint Vincent (Directive)

Whereas part-time students make up a significant portion of the postsecondary education population

BIRT CFS strongly recommend to all member and non-member associations as well as university administrations in general to grant full rights and privileges to part-time students, such as class scheduling, childcare, student fees and services etc., that are granted to full-time students

BIFRT member associations be encouraged to pursue all avenues to prevent discrimination against part-time students

BIFRT the National Executive be directed to actively lobby against discrimination toward part-time students.

SR 9 Brock/Mount Saint Vincent (Directive)

Whereas Canada, percentage wise, significantly underfunds transportation when compared to the United States

BIRT CFS lobby the Canadian government to provide funding for transportation costs of students, as to lessen the financial burden on students;

BIFRT CFS/FCE lobby the federal government to produce a study on the specific transportation needs of post-secondary students in Canada

SR 10 Windsor/Mount Saint Vincent (Directive)

Whereas the new federal budget cuts to VIA rail will affect the number of trains able to run and

Whereas the trains are heavily used by students for inexpensive transportation and since VIA in the past has given students a discount by recognizing the amount of use of the train by students;

BIFRT CFS/FCE call on the respective governmental agency in each province to facilitate the implementation of a discount bus pass program for all post-secondary school students.

Whereas CFS supports the concept of self government; and

Whereas CFS has initiatives to increase First Nations Students representation through the Indigenous Caucus; and

Whereas First Nations Students deal with issues regionally and nationally of specific concern to their interest; and

BIRT CFS support First Nations Students initiatives to hold a National First Nations Students gathering.

SR 13 MSVU/SFU

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(Directive)

Whereas First Nations Students continues to deal with a crisis situation as a result of the federal governments intention to implement a Post-Secondary Education Assistance Policy which denies First Nations Students access through a 'cap' on funding; and

Whereas First Nations students continues to lobby for a moratorian on proposed policy and in the interim the E-12 guidelines remain in effect; and

Whereas First Nations Students continue to lobby for a bilateral process which ensures First Nations people have direct input into policies which effect their lives and rights; and

Whereas CFS has been responsible and active in supporting First Nations initiatives in protecting their rights as Aboriginal Peoples and as

BIRT CFS continue to actively support First Nations Students positions through improving communications, networking, lobbying and campaign.

BIFRT CFS actively lobby the Federal government to deal with the issues and concerns of the peoples of the First Nations.

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SR 14 DOUGLAS/WINNIPEG (POLICY)

Whereas the "Declaration of Student Rights", as well as the "Declaration of International Student Rights" and the Federation's Policy on "International Issues" make abundantly clear that the federation recognizes, believes in, and commits itself to addressing and setting upon both educational and political issues (as far as there can be any logical or concrete separation between the two); and ;

Whereas there seems to be a significant number of members of the Federation should only deal with so called "educational" issues; and in so far as these members have either

a) a misunderstanding or what the original founding goals of the federation are as stated in the preamble to the Federations constitution & By-laws; and in particular as far as items 5,6,&7 of the preamble are concerned or;

b) choose to ignore those particular items (items 5,6,&7) which objectify an implicit desire to address both the educational/political, as well as national & international issues; and ;

Whereas there is no motion that has ever been put forward or adopted as policy that makes a logical & concrete separation between what is an educational issue and what is a political issue, so that in effect, the distinction between what is an educational issue and what is a political issue is in fact a non-issue given the fact that the implied separation between the two has no actual point of reference, thus rendering the whole idea of "priorizing" educational issues over political issues as totally non-sensical; and;

Whereas there is in fact no clear cut distinction between what is a political issue and what is an educational issue, due to the fact that no such distinction logically or pragmatically exists in so far as all issues, once addressed & acted upon, are in the final Analysis Political.

BIRT it be adopted as policy that: no distinction be made between educational and political issues and that all issues shall be treated as "Issues" and ;

BIFRT all issues addressed by the federation be acted upon and priorized so as to be in keeping with the goals and aims of the constitution.

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SR1 DOUGLAS/SFU

(DIRECTIVE)

Whereas the federation has a policy that opposes racism;

BIRT the Federation support and publically endorse a three day workshop on racism put on by the "Committee For Racism Justice" during the time periods of October or November 1989.

REPORT OF THE LESBIAN/GAY CAUCUS

The Lesbian/Gay Caucus has undergone a sketchy history at Federation General Meetings. There have been times when the Caucus has not met, or has not reported. It is very heartening to note, however, that at this General Meeting the Caucus not only met, but has produced a significant package of resolutions, and made its presence well felt.

Among the first things decided by the Caucus was that a more formal structure was required in order that at subsequent General Meetings, the Caucus could continue to operate effectively. It was with this in mind that the Caucus decided that changes ought to be made in its Constitution (Standing Resolution #8) to provide for a Commissioner and a Steering Committee. To this end, the Caucus has elected James Gill (UNB-F) as its Commissioner, and Lyndon Surjik (Regina) and Vicki Northcott (Regina) as the other members of the Steering Committee.

The Caucus also has decided that its name ought to be changed to more properly reflect its membership. For that reason, it is proposed to rename it the "Caucus of Gay, Lesbian, and Bisexual Persons."

Although most complaints of sexual harrassment fall within the standard connotations, many gay, lesbian, and bisexual persons feel unable to fully express their sexual orientation, nor participate fully within their community because of fears of just such harrassment. As a consequence, the Caucus feels most strongly that Sexual Harrassment policies must reflect the sexual harrassment of people because of their sexual orientation. It is equally imperitive that in diseminating information about sexual harrassment that this recognition is made clear.

Within the grievance procedures for cases of sexual harrassment, the caucus feels that it is imperitive that the Caucus members be represented.

The failure of Governments to amend Human Rights Codes to include Sexual Orientation as a prohibited ground of discrimination means, in short, that gay, lesbian, and bisexual students may be expelled from post secondary institutions, and denied admission, housing, and employment for this reason. This situation is intolerable and the federal, provincial, and territorial governments must be forced to recognize this. It is equally vital that we, as elected student leaders, be aware of the very real necessity for those changes.

The material which the caucus distributed to all delegated illustrates the societal attitudes which we are forced to fight. Condemnation of these attitudes will demonstrate the Federations dedication to Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual students to achieve their maximum potential.

Since an abstention in such cases has the same effect as a negative vote, these bases deny members the right to maintain a neutral position by abstaining. For the same reason, members present who fail to vote through indifference rather than through deliberate neutrality, may affect the result negatively.

The affairs of the Federation will be managed by a board of directors, known as the national executive.

1. Composition

The national executive will be comprised of:

- (a) The following at-large positions elected by the national plenary:
 - (1) National Campaign Coordinator
 - (ii) National Chairperson
 - (iii) National Deputy-chairperson
 - (iv) National Treasurer
- (b) The following representatives elected by their respective provincial components
 - (i) Alberta Component Representative
 - (ii) Pacific Region Component Representative
 - (iii) Saskatchewan Component Representative
- (c) The following positions elected by the member local associations in a particular province:
 - (i) Manitoba Representative
 - (ii) New Brunswick Representative
 - (iii) Newfoundland-Labrador Representative
 - (iv) Nova Scotia Representative
 - (v) Ontario Representative
 - (vi) Prince Edward Island Representative
- 2. Powers and Responsibilities of the National Executive The National Executive:
- (a) shall observe and uphold the objectives of the Federation.
- (b) shall be responsible for the execution and implementation of all Federation decisions.
- (C) will co-ordinate work of Federation members and of the staff of the Federation, as well as any work undertaken in conjunction with provincial components, with local associations, or with their groups.
- (d) is responsible for the management of the national office(s)

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and staff of the Federation.

- (e) will prepare the agenda for each national general meeting of the Federation and will distribute the agenda to all member local associations no later than six (6) weeks prior to the start of the national general meeting:
- (f) will present a written report to each National General Meeting that will include a review of:
 - (i) the activities undertaken on its authority since the previous general meeting
 - (ii) the disposition of all directives given the national executive by the national plenary of the previous general meeting
- (g) will administer the affairs of the Federation in all things and make or cause to be made for the Federation in its name, any kind of contract into which the Federation may lawfully enter, subject to the direction of the national plenary.
- (h) will be bound and guided by the policy established by the Federation in all decision and positions taken.
- (i) is expressly empowered to purchase, lease, acquire, sell, exchange, or otherwise dispose from time to time, of shares, stocks, rights, warrants, options, and other securities: land, buildings or other property, moveable or immovable, real or personal; or of any right or interest therein owned by the Federation, for such consideration and upon such terms as the Executive deems advisable.
- (j) may from time-to-time delegate such of its collective or individual duties and powers, excepting the casting of votes. as it deems fit.
- (k) shall comply with the will of the national plenary unless in the opinion of the national executive:
 - (i) significant new facts have discovered; and
 - (ii) the interest of the individual members would be adversely affected by acting in accordance with will of the national plenary. In the event that the national executive acts contrary to the will of the national plenary, it will immediately inform the member local associations in writing of its decision and the reasons for the decision, and include the matter on the agenda of the next national general meeting.

(८)	perform all duties as described in the Provincial Component Representative's Job Description established as a standing resolution.

- 8. Duties and Powers of Provincial Representatives The Provincial Representatives shall:
- (a) be expected to hold a portfolio as assigned by the National Executive.
- (b) perform all duties as described in the Provincial Component Representatives' Job Description established as a standing resolution.
- 9. Calling of National Executive Meetings
- (a) The National Executive will meet no less than four (4) times between each annual general meeting
- (b) Except as otherwise required by law, the National Executive may hold its meetings at such places as it may from time to time determine.
- (c) Notice of meetings of the National Executive must be
 - (i) received orally or in writing by each member of the National Executive and each member local association not less than seven (7) days prior to the start of the meeting; or
 - (ii) sent for delivery to each member of the National Executive and each member local association not less than fourteen (14) days prior to the start of the meeting.
- (d) No formal notice of a meeting of the National Executive is

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required provided:

- (i) all National Executive Members are present; or
- (ii) those absent have signified their consent to hold a meeting;
- (e) Meetings of the National Executive may be formally called by the:
 - (i) National Chairperson;
 - (ii) National Deputy-chairperson; or
 - (iii) National Treasurer.
- 10. Procedure at National Executive Meetings
 - (a) The Quorum for the transaction of business at meetings of the National Executive will be at least one-half of the members of the National Executive
 - (b) The most recent edition of <u>Robert's Rules of Order</u> shall govern the conduct of all meetings of the National Executive.
- 11. National Executive Remuneration
 - (a) Any remuneration to paid to members of the National Executive shall be determine by the national plenary except as otherwise provided for in this Bylaw.
 - (b) Should any member of the National Executive be employed by or perform services for the Federation other than as a member of the National Executive, or be a member or a firm or shareholder, director or officer, of a company that is employed by, or performs services for the Federation, this shall not disentitle such member of the National Executive or such firm as the case may be, from receiving proper remuneration for such services."

The election for Provincial Component Representatives shall be conducted at such times as set out in the Bylaws of the respective provincial components.

- (f) Timing of Elections for Provincial Representatives The election for Provincial Representatives shall be conducted at the annual general meeting or at a caucus meeting of the member local associations from the respective provinces during the four (4) months prior to the annual general meeting.
- 3. Procedures for Election of National Executive Members
 - (a) Procedure for the Election of At-large Members Elections for National Campaign Coordinator, National Chairperson, National Deputy-chairperson and National Treasurer shall be conducted at national general meetings subject to the following rules and procedures:

(i) Elections shall be conducted by secret ballot; (ii) Each member local association present at the general meeting will be permitted one (1) vote in each election; and (iii) A nominee must receive a majority of the votes cast in order to be elected.

(b) Procedure for the Election of Provincial Component Representatives

> Elections for Provincial Components representatives shall be conducted subject to the following rules and procedures:

(i) Elections will be held at the annual general meeting, at a caucus of the member local associations held during the four (4) months prior to annual general meeting and convened by the National Executive, or by mail vote as conducted by the National Executive

(ii) Elections shall be conducted by secret ballot;

(iii) Each member local association from the respective province will be permitted one (1) vote in each election; and

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- (iv) A nominee must receive a majority of the votes cast in order to be elected.
- 4. Term of Office for National Executive Members
 - (a) National Campaign Coordinator The term of office of the National Campaign Coordinator shall expire at the end of the closing plenary of the following annual general meeting.
 - (b) National Chairperson The term of office of the National Chairperson shall expire at the end of the closing plenary of the following annual general meeting.
 - (c) National Deputy-chairperson The term of office of the National Deputy-chairperson shall expire at the end of the closing plenary of the following annual general meeting.
 - (d) National Treasurer The term of office of the National Treasurer shall expire at the end of the closing plenary of the following annual general meeting.
 - (e) Provincial Component Representatives Provincial Component Representatives shall hold office for a term as set out in the Bylaws of the respective provincial components.
 - (f) Provincial Representatives Provincial Representatives shall hold office for a term of one (1) year from the end of the closing plenary of the annual general meeting to the end of the closing plenary of the following annual general meeting.
- 5. Removal from Office of National Executive Members
 - (a) Removal of At-large Members The National Campaign Coordinator, National Chairperson, National Deputy-chairperson and National Treasurer may be removed from office by a two thirds vote at a national general meeting or by mail-out vote.
 - (b) Removal of Provincial Component Representatives Provincial Component Representatives may be removed from office as set out in the Bylaws of their respective provincial components.
 - (c) Removal Provincial Representatives Provincial Representatives may be removed from office by a two thirds vote of their respective provincial caucus at a national general meeting or by mail.
 - (d) Initiation of Removal from Office Proceedings Removal from Office Proceedings against an at-large member of the National Executive may be initiated by:
 (i) a two-third vote of the National Executive; or
 - (ii) a petition signed by no less than three member local associations presented to the National Executive.
- 6. Replacement of National Executive Members(a) Vacancy in an at-large National Executive Positions

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in the event of a vacancy in the position on National Campaign Coordinator, National Chairperson, National Deputy-chairperson, or National Treasurer:

- (i) the National Executive shall have the authority appoint a member of the National Executive to fi the position, until the next national general meeting; and
- (ii) a by-elections for the position shall be conduct: at the next National General Meeting as per the election procedures set out in the bylaws.

Whereas recently annouced changes to employment insurance appear to further strengthen the practice of the expenditure of federal job-training funds on on-the-job training; and,

Whereas the Federation lacks a coherent membership development strategy for community colleges and technical institutes,

BIRT the Federation formulate a strategy to combat the trend towards on-the-job training as opposed to training in public institutions through the Canadian Jobs Strategy and the proposed changes to unemployment insurance, and

BIFRT the Federation work with groups such as the National Union of Provincial Government Employees who are also interested in maintaining funding for training and education in public institutions in the development of this strategy, and

BIFRT the National Executive have research produced documenting the relationship between programs of the federal government and the financing of community colleges and technical institutions.

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REPORT OF THE PROGRAMMES COMMITTEE

1. CIDA PROPOSAL

It was noted that this year the CFS had been approached by the Canadian International Development Agency regarding a project which would involve an international youth exchange. While CIDA was unsure of the exact nature of such an initiative, it would likely involve some type of work experience and would be funded through the Youth Initiatives Program. Concern was expressed that this might be a duplication of other programs such as Crossroads and Canada World Youth. It was explained that if such an initiative was undertaken it would also involve on-campus education on development issues (ie. speakers series, workshops etc.). Some concern was expressed about job displacement in the hosting developing countries. The committee felt that the program should concentrate on placing students in Non-governmental Organizations, and in Canadian based companies who have operations in a given developing country. The committee felt strongly that the membership should be involved in the formulation of the proposal and that members should receive information on the progress of negotiations between CFS and CIDA. (See Programs 1.)

2 . DOMESTIC SWAP

Discussion was held on the inadequacy of current language immersion programs offered by the government in terms of duration. It was discussed that this was an area in which CFS-S could develop a type of work or work/study program almost like a domestic SWAP program. Further to this point, it was discussed that we might also become involved in an inter-provincial cultural exchange that was not necessarily language-based. (See Prog. 2,3)

3. SKILLS DEVELOPMENT

The committee looked at ways to improve our skills develoment. Ideas including organizing on a regional and national level, by bringing not only student association executives to various meetings but a wider group of student leaders including club presidents and councillors. It was noted that an attempt should be made to encourage executive members who do not normally attend CFS General meetings to become involved (ie. VP Services, VP Programmes etc.) in an attempt to create a "services stream" within CFS and to make more of a given association's student leaders aware of all facets of the organization. It was noted that many National Student Unions in other countries operate such programmes and we could draw upon their expertise. The general result would be a reduction of apathy through improved representation. (See Prog.4)

4. TRAVEL CUTS

A concern was expressed by the committee that many members do not know the benefits that they receive from the ownership of CUTS. Therefore the committee thought that an information package about the numbers of students served and how much money they saved could be sent to member campuses in the existing mailouts (eg. handbook materials). (See Prog.5)

5. SWAP

Discussion on SWAP centred around the accessibility of the program, particularily with regard to students in need and with regard to age restrictions. The committee discussed possible alternative funding sources including private bank loans, loans from CFS itself, extension of student loans, and government grants. The committee felt that the age restrictions on the programs prohibited many mature students from access to SWAP. (See Prog. 6)

6. CPS

It was felt by the committee that we should try to improve the affordability of speakers to small budget members. Members also felt that block booking should be enhanced. The committee felt that the CPS catalogues should be targetted to clubs and associations on campus as well as student unions. One idea put forward was the possibility of soliciting corporate donations for air tickets, accomodation, and vehicles. (See Prog. 7)

7. CFSNET

Currently the electronic mail function of CFSNET is being used well, however, concern was expressed that other functions such as the database, the bulletin boards, and CFS NEWS is not being used to its full capacity. The committee would strongly encourage member associations to expand usage of the network beyond themselves to clubs and other on-campus groups. The committee requested that information on copyright ownership be made available. It was reported that the software company owns the copyright and leases a customized version to CFS-S. The committee talked about ways to expand the CFSNET database. These included student unions profile, and member association's constitutions. In future CFSNET mailouts the following information should be provided; a database abstract, surveys of student unions, the desirability of other groups to subscribe, and requests for usage ideas. The committee felt that the National Executive should look into the ethics of CFSNET use.(see prog.8)

8. PROGRAMMES COMMITTEE

Frustration was expressed that despite a plenary mandate, programmes was still spending too much time on programmes description and not enough time on creative suggestions and discussion. It was felt that a very specifically annotated agenda would help a great deal. (See. prog.9)

9. ISIC

The committee noted the changes to ISIC for this year including the improved plastic format and the merger of the ISIC with the International Union of Students discount card. In relation to notice 16, the committee felt that the increased cost of the ISIC should be related to the changes in production cost and ensure a maintenance of current profitability. The committee felt that to respond to the intent of notice 16, that a policy be adopted ensuring that a member - non-member differential will continue to exist. (see Prog.10 and 11).

10. STUDENT ASSOCIATION DIRECTORY

Some concern was raised that the Directory should more explicityl reflect which associations are members of the Federation and which are not. It was noted that members associations who wanted to have their local numbers included should have that option. Concern was expressed with regard to the cost of the Directory production. (see Prog.12).

Please note that the minutes of our meetings are available upon request from the National Office. We would also like to thank the many resource people and those who recorded the minutes (Lara, Cathy Campbell, and Robin Russell).

The Campaign Committee and the Government Relations Committee were combined to facilitate the coordination of their efforts and the actions of the Federation in the upcoming year. During our sessions the committees broke into sub-committees to focus their individual efforts. It is the opinion of the committees' members that the above process was an effective method for meeting our mandates. Another innovation was to send a representative to the N.E.P.Committee as an observer, to garner knowledge of the issues being discussed. This aided us in identifying the issues and setting campaign priorities.

We began with an overview of Campaign 88-89 and government relations to date. The four phases of Campaign 88-89 were not utilized to their full potential. General consensus at the roundtable was that a National Campaign was not realized.

National Student Day was seen as a successful event to be further developed within the National Campaign. National Week of Action was also reviewed: problems with the dates, communication and materials led to an overall feeling that the Week was not as successful as previous years.

The Executive Officer presented a review of government relations. Concerns were raised about the recent federal budget and the implications it will have on PSE funding.

While discussing PSE issues it was noted that 1990 is the International Year of Literacy and we hope that this may be implemented into our campaign.

The following issues were identified as issues for Campaign 89-90: Funding, Accessibility and Native Students. We believe that these should be included in the National Campaign.

Many themes were suggested and the committee has decided to refer the decision on the Campaign's theme to the National Executive. The committee also discussed possible events to be planned for the Campaign. A list of priority campaign materials was devised, subsequently a budget for these materials was submitted to the Budget Committee. Committee members emphasized the importance of tangible promotional materials to be distributed to member locals in order to raise the profile of the Federation. Also the idea of leaving the date off of posters was suggested to allow flexibility in planning events.

The committee proposes the investigation of implementation of an order form in order for member associations to choose campaign materials most appropriate for their local campuses.

Members were favourable to bringing back the CFS Tabloid. This issue was referred to Budget by the Membership Development Committee.

OVERVIEW OF ACTIVITIES PLANNED

(1) Government Relations: The Committee proposes a National Rally and Lobby Effort during the November SAGM 1989 focusing on federalprovincial relations.

(2) National Students' Day (NSD): The Committee proposes a NSD for October 18, 1989 to celebrate the positive contribution of students to our communities. To encourage awareness at a Federal Government level, we encourage member locals to participate in a National Postcard Campaign. Please refer to the resolutions for possible events that member locals may plan and implement on National Student Day.

(3) National Week of Action (NWA): Along with resolutions pertaining to NWA, the committee identified funding and accessibility as the priority issues for the week. Included within these are: EPF, tuition, enrolment caps, student assistance, budget cuts, native students, child care, library funding, physical accessibility, gender barriers, differential fees. We believe that NWA must have a national focus but must be flexible to reflect the diversity of our member local associations. The committee looks forward to developing the NWA plan further at the SAGM.

(4) If You Seducation: February 14 was identified as an opportunity to take advantage of a caring loving special day to create a Kinder and Gentler Education. This warm and cuddly

contact with federal and provincial government representatives in the Departments of Education is to encourage consistent government relations. This activity with member locals in an upbeat way, will create upbeat people with upbeat natures.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the members of the two committees for their patience, cooperation, and energy.

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LOBBY COMMITTEE REPORT CLOSING PLENARY MAY VICIORIA 1988

The Lobby Committee recognizes the importance of Lobby Day to the Semi-Annual General Meeting in Ottawa and to the Federation Federal MPs and bureaucrats communicate with the itself. Chairperson, members of the National Executive and staff on a regular basis, but it is important to remind the politicians that these people represent over 400,000 students nation-wide. Lobby Day also serves to increase the profile of the Canadian Federation of Students on Parliament Hill, in the media, to the general public and to the students themselves.

The Lobby Committee also recognizes the importance of establishing a definite structure for Lobby Day to ensure maximum efficiency and member participation. Therefore the Lobby Committee has devised a strategy concerning Lobby Day. This strategy is divided into pre-SAGM, SAGM, and post-SAGM initiatives.

The main purpose of the pre-SAGM strategy is to inform the members of what Lobby Day is all about, the issues that will be discussed, provide press releases, etc. from past lobby days, and to encourage the membership to contact their MPs before they arrive in Ottawa.

Lobby Day activities at the SAGM will begin with a Lobby workshop. This will orientate members to the Lobby Day structure, provide tips and guidelines for lobbying, and provide information regarding the issues of concern being focused on.

On the day prior to the actual Lobby Day, individual members special interest caucuses and constituency groups will be encouraged to meet with Cabinet Ministers, Critics and other MPs to discuss issues relevant to them. The actual Lobby Day itself will consist of meetings with each of three federal political party caucuses. Pre-written questions will be asked to each of the three caucuses. All individual members will be encouraged to attend these meetings. e de la contra de la La contra de la contr

Members are also invited to attend Question Period in the House of Commons. Following this, the National Executive will hold a press conference on Parliament Hill. Later in the evening, a debriefing will be held to get comments on Lobby Day from members, to gauge initial reaction of the press and MPs, and to apply the events of the OI THE day to happenings in their own local.

Post-SAGM strategy will consist of mail-outs to member locals from the national office. These will contain press clippings, member reports and suggestions, and comments from the media and Parliament. Members will also be encouraged to write their MPs after Lobby Day either thanking them for attending and expressing the desire for continuing communication or severely chastising them for their lack of attendance.

The Lobby Committee also discussed the importance of member locals maintaining contact with their local elected representatives both on the provincial and national level on a regular basis. This committee therefore recommends that member locals continually maintain a high level of contact with their elected officials.

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Report of the Gay and Lesbian Caucus Canadian Federation of Students Seventh Annual General Meeting

This meeting has been both a difficult and a positive meeting for the members of the Gay and Lesbian Caucus.

As always, many who might have attended our meeting were unable to due to other conflicting duties or mandates from their student associations. Despite these problems our caucus enjoyed relatively successful meetings.

At this meeting there has been an increase in the number of delegates outside of our group who were eager to participate in the caucus.

Many of you may know that our caucus is not open to all delegates. Among some this creates a bit of unease or suspicion. I would like to take this opportunity to remind the plenary that this situation is necessary in the minds of some of the members of our caucus. By having a closed caucus we encourage and support the participation of any delegate who is uncomfortable with the idea of others being aware of their sexuality. It is difficult for a heterosexual, who enjoys the full support and understanding of society, to appreciate the complexity and intensity of the decision of a lesbian or gay man to risk the inappropriate condemnation of those around them if they are open, or simply honest, about their sexuality.

In the past the motions brought forward by this caucus have been in the form of directives. The Federation endorses a fairly comprehensive statement of students' rights. It was the feeling of caucus that more specific policy relating to the right to equality of all gays and lesbians was needed. Furthermore, it was felt that the Federation should solidly support amendments to the federal and provincial charters which would specifically guarantee the basic human rights of lesbian and gay individuals.

- WHEREAS The Canadian Federation of Students endorses a policy of freedom from discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation within our policy of Rights of a Student, and,
- WHEREAS The plenary has in the past directed the National Executive to write letters to M.P.'s endorsing the inclusion of sexual orientation under prohibited grounds for discrimination in the federal Charter of Human Rights And Freedoms.
- BIRT The Federation actively support amendments to the Charter of Rights and Freedoms or any provincial Human Rights legislation that proposes the inclusion of sexual orientation as an area of prohibited grounds for discrimination.
- BIFRT The Federation recognize the right of gay and lesbian students to form campus organizations.
- BIFRT Member locals be encouraged to actively support the right of gay and lesbian students to organize on campus.
