OPENING PLENARY SUNDAY, MAY 24, 1992 EDMUNDSTON, NB

1. CALL TO ORDER

The Federation Chairperson, Kelly Lamrock, called the meeting to order. He welcomed delegates and observers to the 1992 General Meeting.

2. ROLL CALL OF MEMBER LOCAL ASSOCIATIONS

The Chairperson conducted a roll call of the members and declared quorum to be present. He also read out proxy votes. (See Appendix A).

3. ACCEPTANCE OF PLENARY AGENDA

6. OPENING REMARKS AND INTRODUCTIONS

Lamrock welcomed the delegates to Edmundston and Saint Louis Maillet, and noted that this was the first general meeting to be held at a francophone school.

He introduced members of the 1991-92 National Executive Committee as well as members of the 1992-93 National Executive, some of which are the same people. In-coming members include Tobie Myers (BC NE rep.), Tammy Yates (NB NE rep.), Blair O'Connor

(NS NE rep.), Jo-Anna Murphy (PEI NE rep.), Deward King (Nfld./Lab. NE rep.), Sandra Rein (Treasurer), and Jaimie McEvoy (Deputy Chairperson).

Lamrock also introduced the Constituency Group Commissioners and Provincial Component Chairs. He welcomed international guest, Eugene Arokiassamy, Treasurer of the National Union of Students - United Kingdom.

Allison Lewis, Deputy Chairperson and Staff Relations Officer, introduced staff members from the Toronto and Ottawa offices including field staff.

7. EXPLANATION OF PLENARY RULES AND PROCEDURES

Information on plenary rules and procedures is included in the delegate kits ("Plenary Procedure at a Glance"). These procedures known as Robert's Rules of Order exist to facilitate discussion and communication during the meeting. The Plenary Chair offered to explain the procedures to delegates who needed assistance. She said that some regulations exist within the Federation's own by-laws, such as the priority list for speakers addressing plenary (which is the speaking order she would recognize at this meeting). Also, for each resolution she would entertain three speakers for and three speakers against a given motion.

Lamrock gave an overview of the general meeting agenda. Workshops hosted by members of the National Executive would be held on Monday, May 25 and Thursday, May 28. Other events included the Canadian Federation of Students(-Services) programmes open house, an open forum on income contingency, an election readiness committee meeting, election of representatives to the Travel CUTS Board, and social events hosted by Saint Louis Maillet. Delegates were asked to check the daily program at the main entrance for the day's events.

Lewis explained the Travel CUTS election procedure. There would be an opportunity at this meeting to elect 2 at-large representatives to the Travel CUTS Board. A question and answer period (one hour in english, one hour in french) would be held on Thurs. May 28 followed by an election on Fri. May 29 at 9:00 am. Nominations were open as of today and would be closed on Thursday. Brian Humphreys, Alberta Fieldworker, agreed to be the Chief Returning Officer and would work with the Plenary Chair on the election. Lewis said that specific election procedures could be found in the Federation by-laws.

- f) the Steering Committee shall meet two days prior to national general meetings.

5. Duties of the Chairperson of Steering Committee:

- b)a) the Chairperson shall represent the concerns, needs and positions of the Commission to the National Executive;
- eb) the Chairperson shall act as a liaison between the constituency groups;
- d)c) the Chairperson shall assist the constituency groups as required;
- e)d) the Chairperson shall report to the National Executive on the work of the constituency groups;

1. Qualifications

The National Executive shall consider the following qualifications when hiring an Ombudsperson:

a) expertise in handling cases of harassment and sexual harassment;

b) knowledge of the legal implications of harassment and sexual harassment;

c) knowledge of general meeting procedures;

d) counselling skills; and

e) understanding of the specific problems of harassment faced by traditionally disadvantaged groups.

2 Duties

a) The Ombudsperson shall address issues of harassment in conjunction with the Harassment and Grievance committee.

b) The Ombudsperson shall act as an impartial investigator of complaints using the Federation's harassment and sexual harassment policies as guidelines.

c) The Ombudsperson shall have the authority to resolve complaints where the solution does not involve restricting either party's involvement in the General Meeting.

d) The Ombudsperson shall not have the authority to make changes in harassment policy but may make recommendations to the Harassment and Grievance Committee and /or the National Executive for improvement."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the policy under the heading "Sexual Harassment and Grievance Committee Procedure" be replaced with the following policy:

"Harassment and Grievance Complaint Procedure

The Federation shall employ the following procedure for dealing with complaints of harassment and sexual harassment:

1. Complaints

Anyone participating in a Federation General or Executive meeting who believes that she or he has been a victim of harassment or of sexual harassment or who has witnessed an incident of harassment or of sexual harassment may seek the confidential advice of the Ombudsperson and, where appropriate, of the Harassment and Grievance committee. The individual may do so by first contacting one of her or his constituency group Liaison Officers.

2. Procedures

Where possible, the Ombudsperson shall resolve any complaint through a process of mediation and education by: a) assisting all parties involved in the complaint in determining the basis, where appropriate, for a complaint of harassment or sexual harassment;

b) assisting all parties in formulating the complaint and/or response;

c) hearing the complaint and counselling the complainant;

d) meeting with the respondent and advising them of the complaint;

e) where appropriate, undertaking a confidential and independent investigation of the complaint, respecting the right of each party to know and respond to all allegations; and

f) employing any other method or procedure felt appropriate by the Ombudsperson given the particular circumstances of a given incident.

3. Solutions

a) Considerations affecting the actions of the Ombudsperson and the Harassment and Grievance committee shall include:

i) the severity of the harassment;

ii) the nature or character of the harassment, whether inadvertent or deliberate;

- iii) the circumstances affecting any party which may have aggravated or mitigated the situation; and
- iv) the frequency of the harassment.

b) Where an offence is found to have occurred, every reasonable effort will be made to provide a remedy for the experience of harassment or sexual harassment and to protect the complainant from any subsequent harassment or discrimination which might arise as a result of the complaint.

c) The Ombudsperson shall have the authority to resolve the complaint through any measure that does not restrict either party's ability to participate in the general meeting, including but not limited to:

an apology to those victimised by the harassment;

- ii) recommendations for outside counselling;
- iii) preventing contact between the parties involved;
- iv) exonerating the respondent of allegations.

d) Where the Ombudsperson finds that a solution that involves restricting either party's ability to participate in the general meeting is appropriate, he or she shall bring the case to the Harassment and Grievance committee along with any recommendations on a possible solution. Such solutions may include but are not limited to:

- i) the removal of an individual from committee, caucus and/or constituency activities
- ii) the removal of an individual from the activity in which the harassment occurred; and
- iii) the outright ban from the General Meeting or the National Executive Meeting.

The terms of any sanction imposed are to include the length of time of the sanction. This time interval is to be made known to the complainant, the individual in question, and the National Chairperson of the Federation.

4. National Executive Meetings

The Harassment and Grievance committee struck during a National Executive meeting shall take on the duties which, during a general meeting, are assigned to the Ombudsperson and the Harassment and Grievance committee.

5. Appeals

Either party may appeal in writing the actions taken by the Harassment and Grievance committee. The appeal shall be brought: a) during the general meeting in which the incident(s) occurred. In this case the appeal committee shall be formed by the Chairperson of the Federation, the Women's Commissioner, and the Commissioner, or one of the Co-commissioners, of the Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Constituency Group; or

b) during the National Executive meeting in which the incident(s) occurred. In this case the appeal shall be heard by the National Chairperson of the Federation."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the policy under the heading "Sexual Harassment and Grievance Committee" be replaced with the following policy:

"Harassment and Grievance Committee

1. Composition

The Federation shall strike, during opening plenary at every national general meeting, a Harassment and Grievance committee. The Women's Constituency Group and the Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Constituency Group shall be allotted cumulatively at least one and a half hours prior to the opening plenary, during which they will proceed to the nomination of the members of the Harassment and Grievance committee in accordance with this policy. The Harassment and Grievance committee shall:

a) have jurisdiction over matters arising during the meeting and for the duration of the meeting, from the day of registration to the day of closure;

b) be comprised of two female delegates and one male delegate as nominated by the Women's Constituency Group, and two members, at least one of whom will be a woman, nominated by the Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Constituency Group;
 c) be ratified in opening plenary.

2. Role

The Harassment and Grievance committee shall:

S .

a) educate the delegates on the issues surrounding harassment and sexual harassment in order to prevent further incidents;
 b) deal with those allegations of harassment and sexual harassment, referred to them by the Ombudsperson, in a confidential, educational and preventative manner;

c) propose policy changes to closing plenary.

3. Liaison Officers

a) The Aboriginal Students Constituency Group, the Francophone Students Constituency Group, the Students with Disabilities Constituency Group, the International Students Constituency Group, and the Students of Colour Constituency Group shall each elect two Liaison Officers, at least one of whom shall be a woman.

b) The role of the Liaison Officers will be to facilitate access to the Ombudsperson and the Harassment and Grievance committee by members of the respective constituencies. The Liaison Officers may also serve as resource persons for the Harassment and Grievance committee with respect to complaints which relate to the specific circumstances of the above mentioned constituency groups.

4. Meeting of Liaison Officers and Harassment and Grievance Committee

During Opening Plenary and immediately after the Plenary has ratified the selection of the members of the Harassment and Grievance committee, the Plenary Chair shall announce the time and date of a meeting of the Harassment and Grievance committee and all the Liaison Officers with the Women's Commissioner and the Ombudsperson. This meeting will be held at the earliest opportunity after the first meeting of the constituency groups. The purpose of the meeting will be to review the Federation sexual harassment and harassment policies and procedures.

5. National Executive Meetings

The National Executive shall strike at its meeting immediately following the national annual general meeting, a Harassment and Grievance committee for National Executive meetings comprised of one woman member of the National Executive committee holding the Women's Portfolio and two other members of the National Executive committee, one male and one female, as elected by the National Executive committee. The committee shall:

a) educate the National Executive committee members on the issues surrounding harassment and sexual harassment in order to prevent further incidents;

b) deal with allegations of harassment and sexual harassment among National Executive members in a confidential, educational, and preventative way; and

c) review Federation harassment policies in order to make recommendations to the National Executive about possible changes." REFERRED TO ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Whereas public pressure as already imposed by Amnesty International, the Anglican Church of Canada, the Assembly of First Nations, the Canadian Auto Workers, the Canadian Labour Congress, the New Democratic Party of Canada, the World Council of Churches, Warren Allmand (Liberal MP and Solicitor General in 1976), and many other organizations is vital to Leonard Peltier receiving justice;

3. MEMBERSHIP

Membership of the Constituency Group shall include all part time students and students who define themselves as mature students including, but not limited to, those students who have been out of school for three or more years, students with dependents and/or students over the age of 23 who are delegates of Federation member institutions at general meetings of the Federation. This membership shall participate and vote at all meetings of the Constituency Group. Subject to ratification by the Constituency Group, this Constituency Group may also include students who are non-delegate representatives of member or non-member associations.

RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES OF MEMBERS

All members of the Constituency Group are entitled to attend any meetings and speak to any matter or motion that may arise and vote at such meetings.

5. RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES OF NON-MEMBERS

Non-members shall be entitled to observe any meetings of the Part Time and Mature Students Constituency Group, and may speak on any matter arising at such a meeting. Non-members may not vote at meetings of the Constituency Group.

6. MEETINGS

That is not to imply that our voice was not heard, on the contrary, the constituency seemed to take on a life of it's own and gave a resounding message to the rest of the student leaders. Our message is simple. We will accept nothing less than that which is our right. We have the right to be represented in all committees. We have the right to organize. And last, but not least, we have the right to expect the support of the Federation to achieve our goals. This support includes both the reaffirmation of a progressive policy statement and the financial resources whereby we can implement and realize the objectives set out therein. At the Opening Plenary of this meeting a challenge was issued by Rock Matte, and endorsed by the women delegates of the constituency, that all Federation Member Locals INCLUDE at least ONE ABORIGINAL STUDENT in their delegation to the next general meeting. We are confident that Member Locals will take up the challenge.

The constituency unanimously endorsed the T-Shirt slogan and design which was previously budgeted for through the campaigns committee of the General Meeting held in Lethbridge. The focus of the campaign was to address 500 YEARS OF RESISTANCE AND SURVIVAL.

Our motions to the Bilingualism Committee were unanimously adopted. In recognizing Aboriginal Languages as Official Languages of Canada the Federation is in fact rewriting history. First Nations have been subjected to a 500 year onslaught and like endangered species, need protection from extinction. 6. A bachelor degree received by a fine arts student is given the least amount of respect as an educational achievement.

7. In issues of representation so important to the Federation, the voice of fine arts students whose educational experience revolves around these issues is essential.

The committee discussed motion 92.05.N165 and felt that it was important to also consider the high cost and broad range of materials required by fine arts students.

The committee discussed motion 92.05.N106 and felt that we function better as a constituency group since there are members of the Federation who are fine arts students and yet not enroled in an art college. They would be excluded from the group if we were to become a caucus.

At the February NGC meeting in St. John, NFLD, the following five research priorities were established (in ranked order): 1) studentsupervisor relationships, 2) international students, 3) taxation, 4) accessibility for women and minorities, 5) money and funding. To this end, much of our activity in the early part of this meeting was directed toward supporting these research topics. Motions regarding these topics were submitted to Student Rights, Organizational Development, National Education, and Campaigns. We appreciate the support shown for them there and look forward to similar support in plenary.

The NGC February meeting was marked by much concern regarding the future of NGC. Two graduate student organizations have held pull-out referenda from CFS (-S) and five more are scheduled in the next few months. A special committee of NGC examined the situation and recommended three potential courses of action: the status quo, reform within CFS(-S), or establishment of an independent NGC. The course of action chosen was to attempt reforms within CFS(-S) before considering further action. Therefore four motions were presented to this meeting. One was ruled out of order but the remaining three (92.05.N134, 92.05,N136, 92.05.N137) will be discussed by closing plenary. Replacements for the out of order motion are presented below as NGC 1-3. We believe that the passage of these motions would represent a significant expression of goodwill and willingness to support the concerns of graduate students. We look forward to their passage.

The matter of inviting a representative from the National Association of Graduate and Professional Students (the American equivalent of NGC) to the next CFS meeting was raised in International Affairs. The NGC passed a motion supporting this idea.

A local association's application for prospective membership, once accepted by the Federation, shall constitute a binding contract for sections iii), v), and vii).

ii) Notwithstanding Section B iv) of this By-Law, a prospective member may attend no more than one General Meeting of the Federation as a prospective member.

iii) A full membership referendum must be held by the student association before the end of the term of office of the Executive that was in office when prospective membership was granted. In the event that the referendum fails, prospective membership would be terminated.

iv) Prospective membership shall lapse at the end of the opening plenary of the General Meeting following the General Meeting at which prospective membership was granted.

v) The fee for prospective membership in the Federation shall be 5% of the regular Federation membership fee, unless the student association has an individual membership fee of less than \$10.00 per academic year, in which case the fee shall be 2% of the regular Federation membership fee.

vi) Prospective membership allows the student association to have full voting rights at the general meeting in which they were granted prospective membership, but does not allow that prospective member to proxy their vote.

vii) Prospective members must notify the Federation of the date of the full membership referendum no less than two months prior to the referendum.

viii) After a student association has had their prospective membership ratified by plenary, they have full use of Federation resources and materials until their referendum on full membership (see section B, iii).

ix) The Federation may extend prospective membership based on the individual merit of the associations case, irrespective of precedent, by a two-thirds majority vote of plenary.

i) \$1.50 per semester, or \$3.00 per academic year, per local association individual member of the Canadian Federation of Students, pro-rated as per policy of the member local association;

ii) \$.50 per semester, or \$1.50 \$1.00 per academic year, per local association individual member for the Canadian Federation of Students-Services, pro-rated as per policy of the member local association;

iii) the applicable provincial component fee.

(d) A full member local association may only withdraw from the Federation through a referendum subject to the following rules and procedures:

i) Notice of withdrawal referendum must be delivered by registered mail to head office of the Federation not less than six (6) months prior to the referendum;

ii) Notice of withdrawal referendum must include the exact dates of the referendum, rules of the referendum, and referendum question to be used;

iii) Quorum for a withdrawal referendum shall be that of the member local association or five percent (5%) of the individual members of the member local association, whichever is higher;

(e) Full membership in the Federation may only be terminated on June 30th of the Federation's fiscal year in which a member association withdraws.

iii) the applicable provincial component prospective membership fee.

(d) Prospective membership lapses one year after the general meeting in which it is granted, or when the association is ratified as full members, whichever comes first, except as provided in Section 3 (e) of By-law III.

(e) The Federation may extend prospective membership based on the individual merit of the case, irrespective of precedent, by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote.

26. BUDGET COMMITTEE

INTRODUCTION

The committee reviewed, in detail, the third quarter financial statements for the period ending March 31, 1992 for the Federation(s) and its company, Travel CUTS. Additionally, the committee examined membership fee schedules relating to the previous and current fiscal years.

After a thorough review of the financial position of the organization, the committee adjusted draft budgets for the 1992-93 fiscal year and made changes necessary to keep both budgets in healthy positions, and in the case of the Canadian Federation of Students, comply with the 'required surplus' policy. After adjusting both budgets for fixed expenses, the committee was faced with an unenviable task of reducing expenditures by over \$93,000 in the budget of the Canadian Federation of Students (to comply with the surplus policy), and reducing expenditures by amounts adequate enough to retain a surplus sufficient to ensure adequate recapitalisation of Travel CUTS in the budget of the Canadian Federation of Students-Services. The committee attempted to take special care to try to ensure that the reductions were fair, realistic, and spread throughout our organization.

- c. The Advisors shall not have the authority to make changes in harassment policy but may make recommendations to the Harassment and Grievance Committee and/or the National Executive for improvement.
- d. The Advisors shall act as resource persons to all delegates and provide information and education on the issues surrounding harassment, sexual harassment and violence.
- e. The Advisors shall remain available should issues of harassment, which allegedly occurred at the General Meeting, surface after Closing Plenary.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the policy under the heading "Sexual Harassment and Grievance Committee Procedure" be replaced with the following policy:

"Harassment and Grievance Complaint Procedure

The Federation shall employ the following procedure for dealing with complaints of harassment and sexual harassment:

1. Complaints

Anyone participating in a Federation General or Executive meeting who believes that she or he has been a victim of harassment or of sexual harassment or who has witnessed an incident of harassment or of sexual harassment may seek the confidential advice of the Advisors. The individual may do so by first contacting one of her or his constituency group Liaison Officers or a member of the Harassment and Grievance committee.

2. Procedures

a. When a complaint is brought to the Advisors during the course of the General Meeting, the Advisors shall:

i) hear the complaint, counsel the complainant and, where appropriate, assist the complainant in proceeding with a complaint;

ii) do everything in their power to provide a remedy for the experience of harassment or sexual harassment and to protect the complainant from any subsequent harassment or discrimination.

iii) when appropriate and directed by the Harassment and Grievance committee, meet with the respondent in an attempt to educate her/him as to the unacceptable nature of their behaviour;

iv) educate all delegates on the issues surrounding harassment and sexual harassment in order to prevent further incidents;

b. In the event that a harassment complaint is submitted after Closing Plenary, where the alleged incident occurred during the course

of the General Meeting, the Advisors shall:

i) counsel the complainant;

ii) keep records regarding the complaint; and

iii) subsequent to the Harassment and Grievance committee's ratification, submit the said records to the Harassment and Grievance committee at the next General Meeting;

3. Appeals

Either party may appeal in writing the actions taken by the Harassment and Grievance committee. The appeal shall be brought to the Appeal Committee:

a. The Appeal Committee shall be formed by the Chairperson of the Federation, the Women's Commissioner, and one member of the National Executive. At least two people on this Committee shall be women. DEFEATED

Whereas due to the short time period allotted to the lawyers in which to deal with this vital issue, they were only able to provide "initial comments and overview" of the proposed policy, and;

Whereas the lawyers themselves have inadvertently called attention to the National Chairperson's neglect: "we remain at your disposal to provide a more detailed analysis of and to assist you in the preparation of the amended policy.", and;

Whereas the Sexual Harassment Committee from the last general meeting took the time to collaborate on a letter, addressed to the National Chairperson of the Federation dated February 10, 1992 recommending the hiring of an Ombudsperson and urging the National Chairperson to pursue the matter of the Harassment Committee, and;

Whereas the National Chairperson has failed to address any part of the initial directive adequately or with due respect to the seriousness and necessity of the policy, and;

Whereas the National Chairperson has failed to address even the minimal requirements of the directive, where it would have been entirely appropriate to have done so much more.

30. INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

The International Affairs Committee report from November 1991 was discussed and approved. With additional reading of the November 1989 Report of the Ad-Hoc Committee on International Affairs. These documents provided Committee members with an overall picture of the development of the international affairs of the Federation. The Terms of Reference were analyzed, with recommendation for adoption with two additions.

Various issues were outstanding, including what role the committee is to play in directing the international affairs of all sectors of Canadian Federation of Students (Services) work. Motions have been presented in this report, which suggest the leadership role which the Committee foresees itself taking in the future. Evaluation of international projects which the Federation has already embarked upon, including its membership in the International Union of Students (I.U.S.) and the support required for our Representative, Allison Lewis, in the role of I.U.S. Commissioner for Women's Equality in Prague, Czechoslovakia was also discussed.

With the current financial constraints placed on the organisation, initial work to increase the awareness and support for the International Affairs Committee is being planned with the strategy of forging partnerships with student organisations across the country who already have established networks and programs. The inclusion of students, in particular international students currently studying in Canada, will be integral to the development of the international work of the Federation. While the need to nurture local contacts on campuses and in communities is vital, the Federation also needs to work with regional student federations and coalitions, in an effort to bring home the message that students around the world have numerous unifying concerns.
