Caron announce that quorum had been reached.

Caron said a few words to the plenary. He said he had first become an individual member of the Federation in 1987 when the started his studies at the University of Ottawa, 1989, reaffirmation—he vote against the Federation, 1992 president of sfuo. He still had doubts about the Federation. 1993 first direct contact with the Federation through general meeting. However, even though it wasn't perfect, he felt that the Federation represented something he fundamentally agreed with. Now, two years after his first general meeting, Caron understands that the situation is not an easy one. He said it was tragic that an organisation which has worked so well together on such essential issues as tuition fee, student loans and which has seen its share of victories in the past, he said it is sad to see that the Federation considers itself to be in a crisis. A crisis that is internal and structural. He presumes that the questions on everyone's minds is the question of the executive director. Why was the decision taken? He said that the National Executive as a whole had made the decision. He said that the decision was handled in the most efficient way and for the benefit of all parties involved. He said the question that effects the ex-director, was not an easy decision to make for the National Executive. Nevertheless, the with all the facts presented at that National Executive meeting, the National Executive acted in a manner they thought best. Even though the decision was difficult to make, it was in fact, made, and it was made in the interests of the Federation and its members. He said he was asking the membership to take a leap of faith regarding the details. Given that the decision was made, the National Executive is legally prevented from discussing details at this time. He said that while it is no doubt frustrating for the members not to have access to the details of the decision, he said it was also frustrating for members of the National Executive not to be able to share all the information with the members at this time, especially since the National Executive feels it has made the right decision and would like to have an opportunity to justify their actions. Unfortunately the National Executive cannot discuss the matter at this time. After the conclusion of litigation, it will be possible to discuss all the issues with the membership. He would like to ask for a vote of confidence in the National Executive which made a difficult decision but which must make decisions from time to time, and wished delegates well.

Malaspina Students' Union/Camosun College Student Society Be it resolved that the closing plenary agenda be adopted.

95/05:35 MOTION

Memorial Central Student Union/York Federation of Students

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Be it resolved that the closing plenary agenda be amended to include a question and answer period of acting Canadian Federation of Students directors.

The Speaker asked whether the amendment was intended to refer to the National Treasurer and the National Deputy Chairperson.

The mover said that the motion should read acting Canadian Federation of Students-Services Directors.

The Speaker said she was in the process of making a ruling on whether the motion was in order, since nearly the same issue had been discussed in opening plenary.

The mover said the motion was only to refer to Canadian Federation of Students-Services and therefore it was not similar to the issues debated in opening plenary.

Another delegate said that the motion put forward in opening plenary was a motion to amend the opening plenary agenda, and that this motion was to amend the closing plenary agenda and therefore the motion could not be considered dilatory.

The Speaker said the substance of the motions, whether amending the opening or closing plenary agenda, was virtually the same.

A delegate said that because some delegates had spoken to the relative merits of having this session in either the opening plenary or the closing plenary, that the motion was still in order.

The Speaker agreed and invited the mover of the motion to motivate.

A Dalhousie delegate said that a rich diversity of opinions existed in the plenary room. He said regardless of the diversity he said there is one universal necessity required, and that was information. He said regardless of political background, information is required. He said he wanted the right to ask questions of the acting Directors of the Canadian Federation of Students-Services. He said that as it is he is incompetent to represent Dalhousie students.

St. Thomas Student Union spoke in favour of the motion. She said there were important issues facing services this year. She said she wanted to address questions at the services heads. She said that services heads probably had the most information.

Crowley said he was shocked, and said that the mover of the motion needed information in order to go back to the students and make a decision. He wondered what decision Dalhousie delegates had to make since they had already left the Federation and the plenary had de-ratified that student association.

A delegate from Dalhousie rose on a point of privilege and said that his local was a member until June 30, and until that time, he would demand answers.

Crowley said that he found it ironic that the Dalhousie delegates were displaying such concern for the Federation now, given they had voted to withdraw from the Federation.

A Dalhousie delegate called a point of privilege.

The Speaker ruled that delegates could not simply shout point of order any time they disliked what a delegate was saying. She said it was a fact that the Dalhousie Student Union had voted to withdraw from the Federation.

Crowley said it has been stated repeatedly that information cannot be divulged until after the legal process had concluded. He said while there has been a number of complaints regarding translation, he said a far more serious problem seems to be regarding comprehension. He said that questions directed to the National Treasurer and National

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Deputy Chairperson had already been received. He also said that the National Executive decision was made, and nothing else could be said that would not jeopardize the Federation. He said if the delegates were so concerned about the Federation then why were they insisting on drawing out discussion with legal implications which could seriously damage the Federation. He said he thought that bringing forward this motion at this time was the equivalent of blackmailing the members of the plenary.

The Speaker said that using the word "blackmail" was un-parliamentary behavior.

Crowley concluded by urging delegates to defeat the motion, so that the important business that was of genuine interest to individual members, could be accomplished.

Michelle Kemper, a delegate from the Emily Carr Students' Union raised a point of order. She said that past practice was that the microphones were taken in the order of the microphones themselves, not the order in which delegates arrived at the microphone, and asked the Speaker to indicate which process she would be using.

The Speaker said she would call on speakers in accordance with the numbers of the microphones, as per past practice.

The King Edward delegate spoke against the motion. She said she had moved the original motion in opening plenary which provided for a lengthy question and answer period. She said she had had an opportunity to read the report of the National Executive, and then ask questions of the National Executive. She said that the National Executive has fulfilled their commitment to accountability. She said she was not blindly engaging in a leap of faith, but rather she was holding them accountable on many issues, and is satisfied with the responses she received. She said that therefore, it was unnecessary to use more plenary time for such purposes. She also said that the students she was representing had concerns about such things as the Canada Health and Social Transfer and by extension, the research and campaigns for mobilising and lobbying against the Canada Health and Social Transfer. She said her students were also concerned about having an effectively organised national student federation, and urged the plenary to received the reports from the Federations committees. She said that the general meeting was the highest form of decision making within the Federation for a reason—the Federation has an inverse hierarchy. She said putting so much emphasis on the National Executive effectively undermined the authority of the delegates to set the direction for the organisation.

Lamrock, a delegate from the University of New Brunswick-Fredericton Student Union, spoke in favour of the motion. He said that he also wanted to find a healthy student movement, and also wanted to find a healthy services cooperative when the courts restores the membership of the University of New Brunswick-Fredericton Student Union to the Canadian Federation of Students-Services. He said in order to have a healthy movement, one had to discuss what made it sick. He said a student movement sick when it relies on closed doors. He said a student movement was sick when a statement read with trembling hands about decisions done which members couldn't see and weren't informed of is supposed to pass for political discourse. He said a student movement was sick when members aren't allowed to discuss the future programmes. He said he wanted to know whether, in the coup which just took place, the people working in the Toronto office were in fact competent. He said that his intention was not to discuss staffing issues, but rather the level of expertise brought to the Toronto office by the acting Directors. He said that there was nothing stopping the National Executive from moving into a closed session, to let people in on the details. He said that the National Executive could at the very least let the employee in question, the ex-Executive Director, know what the rationale was, and Lamrock pointed out that that had not yet

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happened. He said that the issue was not just a staffing issue—an attachment to David Jones. Lamrock said that it was an attachment to the services cooperative which is there. He said that the National Chairperson reached out and asked the delegates to take a leap of faith. He said that the time to reach out had passed, before 100,000 students relying on this National Executive for health care coverage were left stranged. He said the time to reach out was before programmes like Studentsaver were left hanging in the balance. He said that Caron had tried to reach out, but unfortunately leadership too late is no leadership at all. He said that an open debate was needed about the future of the programmes. He said anyone on Budget Committee knew that it was a virtual soap opera for each programme as committee members assessed which programmes would live and which would die. He said this was all because this executive jumped into a decision it wasn't prepared to take. He said he didn't know whether this National Executive was capable of handling the day to day decisions ahead. He said he did not know whether the health plan would survive, or whether the world's largest student-services cooperative would come out of the meeting okay. He said that regardless of what people might think of himself, or his political disposition, he said that people have a right to ask questions, a right to know there is a future, a right for more than something beyond "trust me it will all come clean." He said he knew because he helped to run the service programmes for two years. He said now was the time to discuss the future of services, and if there was a vision he wanted to discuss it.

A delegate from Malaspina said she was not inclined, unlike the previous speaker, to deliver a long-winded and somewhat inaccurate speech. She said she preferred to present a number of facts. First, she said that there have been 4.5 days of the general meeting during which delegates have had ample time to discuss issues with individual members of the National Executive, provided of course that the delegates had participated fully during that time. Second, she said that closed sessions at local student associations do not take place before the broad local membership. Third, she said that the legal reasons presented by the National Executive are valid, and that no further information could be disseminated without seriously compromising the Federation. Fourth, she said the member local student associations were not responsible for hiring and firing Federation employees, and as stated in the Bylaws, the National Executive is the body responsible for hiring and firing the Executive Director of Canadian Federation of Students-Services.

The Speaker noted that three people had spoken both in favour and opposed to the motion and would move to the vote.

Mount Royal Student Association raised a point of order. He said the Speaker had agreed to call for motions to extend debate when three had spoken in favour and opposed to the motion.

The Speaker said that she would entertain motions to extend debate if they were forthcoming, but she did not think the interests of plenary would be served by routinely begging for the extension of debate.

The Speaker returned to debate on the main motion.

95/05:37 MOTION TO CALL THE QUESTION

Be it resolved that motion 95/05:34 be put to a vote.

DEFEATED

95/05:38 MOTION

Be it resolved that the agenda be amended to immediately move to an incamera session for no less than one hour or until 10:00 pm to discuss the issue of the dismissal of David Jones.

The Speaker ruled the motion out of order since the substance of the motion, to discuss the issue of the executive director, had already been debated and defeated.

A delegate rose on a point of order. He argued that the proposed amendment was in order since it was calling for a motion to move in camera. He said that in an in-camera session, the members or in other words the shareholders, had a right to have information imparted to them. While the substance was the same, the avenue through which it would be accomplished was different and therefore, the motion was in order.

The Speaker accepted the argument. However, she said that if this amendment were defeated, she would then not entertain any other motions with the same substance.

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Harter, the delegate from the City Centre Student Association made a point of order. He noted that the mover of the motion motivated the motion before it was motivated.

The Speaker agreed with the point of order.

Harter had a second point of order. He felt that the delegate who rose on a point of order regarding the amendment was raising points of debate and not strictly outlining a point of order.

The Speaker explained that on complicated points of procedure she preferred to allow the delegate ample time to thoroughly explain the point of order she or he was trying to make. That way her rulings would not simply be reactive.

The Speaker asked for clarification on the motion and asked to whom the motion was intended to apply.

The mover explained that in camera meant that any student who is present representing a student association who is a member of the Federation is bound by the Corporations Act to maintain silence, and that anyone who does not maintain that silence can go to jail.

The Speaker asked whether his intent was to cover staff?

The mover said staff were covered.

The Speaker asked him if all the staff were covered, such as the interpretation staff, the Speaker.

The mover said that only observers had to leave, since they were not members and the staff were.

The Speaker asked for a seconder. Having been moved and seconded, the Speaker allowed motivation.

A York Federation of Students delegate said that a few years ago he had to fight the executive of the York Federation of Students who were negotiating with their Union and they were not telling the board of directors any information. He said he and others had gone to a lawyer and found that because he was a member of the board of directors, he was an officer of the corporation as well, and therefore legally entitled to that entitled, and subsequently so are the shareholders of the corporation. He said that everyone is governed by the various laws governing corporations and in camera sessions. He said that this way, all the questions regarding David Jones firing can be answered and anybody who leaks that information can be thrown in jail and Canadian Federation of Students is legally protected should information be leaked. He said that Canadian Federation of Students would not be liable as long as the National Executive did everything they could to ensure that the matter was kept secret but making sure that the members who were legally allowed to have the information, to have it.

A delegate spoke against the motion. She said she was not a lawyer and said she was worried that it would be irresponsible to proceed in this way even if there was only a small chance that the organisation would suffer as a result of prematurely disclosing information. If the National Executive did not make a proper decision, then it can be addressed at another time. For now, she said it was necessary to have confidence in the National Executive.

Crowley called the question on motion 95/05:38.

95/05:39 MOTION TO CALL THE QUESTION

Be it resolved that motion 95/05:38 be put to a vote.

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The Speaker ruled the motion out of order. She said that it was dilatory insofar as a motion had already passed to allow three more speakers for and against the motion.

95/05:39 OUT OF ORDER

A delegate said he disagreed with the Speaker and said that calling the question was not dilatory, but constantly debating this issue is dilatory. Calling the question was an effort to try to facilitate all the plenary's business, not just this issue.

The Speaker reiterated her ruling that the motion was dilatory.

Crowley challenged the ruling of the Speaker.

95/05:40 MOTION TO UPHOLD THE RULING OF THE SPEAKER

Be it resolved that the ruling of the Speaker be upheld.

The Speaker explained that a motion was passed which extended debate for a length of time. She said that if the plenary continued using points of order then it would be impossible to accomplish any business at all.

95/05:40 CARRIED

King Edward delegate Kemper, said she opposed the motion for all the reasons stated earlier. She said she wanted to be frank. She said she did not want to play games all night. She said everyone knows some delegates want to talk about the executive director issue. She said everyone has had all week to talk to the National Executive about it. She pointed out that those continually wanting to raise this issue have their 19 votes while those who do not want to talk about the issue have their 28. She said everyone was aware that 19 to 28 was not quite two-thirds, so question can't be called. She objected to what she felt was the clear minority trying to subvert, not just the will of the majority here, but the very business of the plenary of importance to all the students who are counting on having a plan of action for the real world for the next six months. She asked the Speaker to do what she could to facilitate the plenary moving on to the next item of business.

A Dalhousie delegate said he felt that many delegates had asked questions of the National Executive and were not satisfied with the responses. He said that when an organisation has doubts about its executive, it uses this venue to question more closely. He said he respected the legal opinion having a discussion in public. He said that when a meeting moves in camera, the public element ceases to exist. He said that what was remains is a board of directors being responsible to the shareholders of the organisation. He said that member locals are the shareholders of the organisation.

A delegate from the Simon Fraser Student Society raised a point of order. He said that in fact the National Executive is the board of directors. He said that plenary represents the 450,000 individual members of the Canadian Federation of Students.

The Dalhousie delegate continued. When the meeting moves in camera, the National Executive is being asked to forgo its reasons for not explaining things publicly. He said that it is dangerous to forfeit one's right to information since organisations can get out of control. He said some delegates think things are already out of control. He said that he hoped the National Executive were listening and not just giggling.

Temelini rose on a point of privilege. He said delegates were supposed to speak to the Speaker and not name individuals.

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The Dalhousie delegate said if the National Executive chooses not to explain its actions to the membership, then the National Executive could be judged accordingly. He said an in camera motion can discuss private matters.

A delegate from the University of Calgary Graduate Student Association said everyone knows why David Jones was fired because he stood in the way of the vision shared by the majority here who will use their majority to defeat us. She said that the National Executive has shown they cannot be trusted. She said that for those people who want to move onto discussing such things as the Canada Health and Social Transfer, if there were no services side, there can be no discussion of important political issues. She said that it is common knowledge that David Jones was not offered a proper severance package and that that was why litigation was pending.

A Memorial delegate said that his student association had been a part of the Federation since 1982. He said he had spoken with many past-presidents of his student association. He said that that David Jones was a great man and a great manager. He said that he wanted the truth. He said when the plenary goes into camera he wants the truth. He said he wanted a chance to debate. He said he wanted to be able to go back to his school and answer questions. He felt that an in camera session was the place to have the discussion and said that everyone was bound by confidentiality not to divulge information heard during the in camera session. He then said his members have the right to know. He said this issue was not just about David Jones, but rather about services.

A delegate asked the National Executive whether an in camera session was employed to dismiss David Jones.

National Treasurer Koenen said the National Executive went into a closed session at the end of the National Executive meeting in April, 1995. The information discussed at that time has remained in such a state.

A delegate said he did not think it fair to discuss any aspect of person's identity in their absence. Having listened to the debate and the harshness in the tones of the delegates, he did not believe that this motion was just about moving into an in camera session. He was concerned that if the motion is adopted, all kinds of other issues will arise. He said that delegates started off saying it was only about David Jones and now suddenly they are saying it has everything to do with services. He said he was strongly opposed to the motion.

95/05:41 MOTION TO EXTEND DEBATE

York Federation of Students

Be it resolved that debate be extended by two speakers in favour and two speakers opposed.

DEFEATED

A roll call vote was requested on motion 95/05:38. The speaker said she would proceed to a roll call vote.

A point of order was raised regarding the roll call vote. He said the call for a roll call was dilatory. It was argued that the Speaker should ask for a mover and seconder and vote on the question.

The Speaker allowed the roll call, but noted that once this motion is dealt with, she would not entertain any more motions or points on the executive director issue.

A point of order was raised regarding those members who were deemed absent at the beginning of the general meeting.

The Speaker said quorum was based on 50% of the members present at the general meeting.

The delegate said that some members did not arrive until after opening plenary, while others had left and he said the Speaker should read the entire membership list.

The Speaker said that if delegates arrived after the first official roll call, but were registered to attend the general meeting, they are on the list of members present. She said it is not necessary to read the entire membership list since quorum to conduct the general meeting had been established at opening plenary.

A delegate asked the Speaker to announce the total membership of the Federation, as well as the numbers present at the plenary session.

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A delegate asked the Speaker to name a few good restaurants in the area.

The Speaker said she was not familiar with the area's restaurants.

The Speaker said that 31 member locals were present at the commencement of closing plenary, and 19 member locals were absent. She said that closing plenary would continue with the motion to adopt the agenda.

A point of order was raised. He said he wanted to know the total number of Federation members.

The Speaker said that there were 66 members of the Federation. She said 33 member locals were required for quorum to start the general meeting. Quorum was achieved in opening plenary when it was established that 50 members were present. From that point onward, only 50% of members present was required to continue with the business of the meeting. She ruled that only 25 members present were required to continue with the business of the meeting.

The delegate raised another point of order. He asked for a ruling on Bylaw II, section 6, which read:

Quorum at General Meetings

A quorum for the transaction of business at any meeting of voting members shall consist of not less than one-half of the members of the Federation having voting rights at the time in person or by proxy.

The Speaker said that her interpretation of the bylaw was that 50% of the members present at the general meeting constituted quorum.

The delegate said that the bylaw said 50% of the members, not members present. He said her ruling contradicted the bylaw.

The Speaker read the bylaw on quorum at general meeting.

City Centre Student Association delegate Harter said that the delegate was continually engaging in cross debate with the Speaker. He said the delegate was simply shouting "point of order" and then immediately launching into debate, without being recognized by the Speaker. He then moved a motion to uphold the ruling of the Speaker.

The Speaker thanked the City Centre Student Association delegate, and said that it is necessary to establish quorum in order to proceed with the business of the meeting. She said that in her opinion, and according to her interpretation of the bylaws, quorum had been achieved. She also said that this interpretation was consistent with the practice of most other national organisations.

The delegate raising the original point of order on quorum said that the ruling was inconsistent with the bylaws of the Federation and also inconsistent with past Federation practice.

A point of person privilege was raised regarding the spectators.

The Speaker said it was not out of order to have observers watching from the doors of the general meeting. The speaker said that regarding the quorum issue, she had made her ruling and that a challenge could be made to the speakers ruling if they so choose.

The delegate continued to argue that at the last general meeting the Speaker ruled that quorum for the continuation of the general meeting was 50% of all the members of the Federation not just of members present. The delegate said that the Speaker upheld the bylaws. He asked whether the Speaker whether her ruling stood.

The Speaker said her ruling stood.

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Crowley raised a point of information. He said that representatives from locals who did not respond to the roll call were nevertheless present, insofar as they continued to observe from the door. He wondered if they should be noted as present.

The Speaker said that those not responding to the roll call were considered to be absent.

A point of privilege was raised. A delegate from Carleton University Students' Association said their local would not challenge the Speaker since they do not recognize the validity of the plenary. He said he wanted to express his disillusionment with the Federation, and bid the plenary good-bye.

The Speaker continued with motion 95/05:42.

A point of privilege was raised regarding the assertion of past precedent. He said that just because a delegate stands and says something does not make it true. He said he was concerned because several delegates had asserted things that may or may not be true. He said something cannot be considered true just because someone stated it. He said the Speaker should ask for documentation and justification when assertions are made. He said he had participated in the November 1994 general meeting and did not remember any ruling on quorum made by the general meeting Speaker. Something is not true just because they believe it to be true.

A point of privilege was raised by a delegate from New Brunswick. He said he cannot believe that a flagrant disregard for the bylaws had just taken place.

The Speaker said that the point of privilege was out of order. She said she had made a ruling and it was not challenged.

Report of the Campaigns & Government Relations Committee

City Centre Student Association/Simon Fraser Student Society

Be it resolved that the following motions CAM 1 through to CAM 9 from the Campaigns and Government Relations Committee be adopted omnibus.

Harter said that the motions should be moved omnibus because the committees represent a wide variety of perspectives and therefore, committee recommendations should be respected. He said that he was excited that it seemed like the plenary was going to have a chance to discuss campaigns. He said that the Campaigns Committee called for an On to Ottawa Trek be organised and coordinated by the Federation. He said the impact of an On to Ottawa Trek would be historical since 1995 is the 60th anniversary of the original On to Ottawa Trek, organized by relief camp workers in 1935. He thought the motion was an excellent way of building on the links that were established in organising for the January 25 day of action. He said the Canada Health and Social Transfer was not just going to affect students but rather the poor, the unemployed, trade unionists, women and so on. He said the On to Ottawa Trek would give the Federation another opportunity to play another leadership role within Canada in the struggle for a more just society. He said the Campaigns Committee did an excellent job.

A point of order was raised. A delegate read from the Federation's Harassment Policy: The Federation does not tolerate harassment in any form. Harassment is defined as the abusive or demeaning treatment of that person which has the effect of creating a hostile or intimidating environment for that person. She said that earlier she had raised a point of privilege regarding the observers, noting that their behavior as observers was creating a hostile and intimidating environment herself and possibly other delegates who sincerely wish to continue with the important business of the Federation. She asked the Speaker to ask the observers to observe from the floor and not from the stairway platform above.

The Speaker called a five minute break.

- 10.20 pm—the meeting recessed.
- 10.36pm—the meeting reconvened.

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A point of order was raised. A delegate from the Association générale des étudiantes et étudiants du centre universitaire de Saint-Louis-Maillet noted the presence of their delegation.

The Speaker said she did not feel capable of making a ruling on harassment, and referred to the Federation's harassment procedures. She did say that having the observers gathering in the stairway platform outside the doors was proving to be very disruptive to the meeting. She therefore respectfully requested that those observers who wished to continue observing the meeting to find seating on the floor of the plenary room. She said that such cooperation would greatly facilitate the meeting. She asked those observers not able to take a seat on the floor, to leave the meeting and allow the plenary session to continue. The Speaker said she would allow a few minutes for observers to come onto the floor of plenary to find seats.

10.38 pm—the meeting recessed.

10.40pm—the meeting reconvened.

The Speaker noted her extreme disappointment that those continuing to observe the meeting from the stairway platform refuse to find seats on the floor of the plenary. She strongly urged those observers to conduct themselves as respectfully as possible or else to leave the meeting.

A delegate asked that CAM 1 be removed from the proposed omnibus package.

City Centre Student Association delegate Harter offered to withdraw the motion.

The Speaker said it did not seem to be necessary.

Trent Central Student Government delegate Galinger said he strongly supported the motion since it reflected a real spirit of both discussion and action.

A Malaspina delegate asked the committee facilitators if there were more details contained in the campaigns other than that which is contained in the resolutions.

National Chairperson Caron said that the resolutions were quite broad to allow for local autonomy in their implementation. He said that the details of the campaigns were discussed at length in the committee and suggested that anyone requiring details of the discussions should contact their campaign committee representatives.

Crowley said he was very impressed with the work of the Campaigns Committee, and thanked those delegates who participated on that committee, including those who may be present but not taking their seats. He said he thought the results of the committee showed that the Federation has objectives that unite students across the country. He said clearly the majority of aims of the Federation can be achieved by consensus. He said this was the raison d'être for the Federation.

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The Federation, in conjunction with social justice groups, participate in an "On to Ottawa Trek" campaign scheduled to coincide with the presentation of the 1996 Federal Budget.

A delegate said that in some provinces there are no social justice groups already working on an On to Ottawa Trek. He said he did not want the Federation to call and coordinate the effort. He said he wanted to work with others on the project.

Trent Central Student Government delegate Galinger said he had a problem with the amendment, because it removes the word march, which denotes action. He said he liked the reference to the Federation working with other social justice groups on the project. He said he would support the amendment and urged the Federation to interpret the word campaign to mean action.

A delegate asked a point of information to the mover of the amendment. He asked what the primary change was: that the Federation not call and coordinate the event but rather just participate, or was the primary change shifting the emphasis from march to campaign.

The mover said that for January 25, many different things were done. He said he wanted the motion to be flexible enough to embrace different local events. He said he wanted the emphasis to be on the Federation working with other groups and not taking control of it from other groups already working on the event.

A delegate spoke in favour of the word campaign over march because the event may involve more than just a march.

95/05:55 CARRIED

Debate resumed on the main motion.

A delegate asked for clarification of why the event was being tied to the On to Ottawa Trek of 1935.

Harter explained that in 1935 there was an On to Ottawa Trek. He said that in 1935. Canada was in the middle of a depression. He said people who were unemployed were rounded up and put into work camps, known as "Relief Camps". He said they were either paid nothing or close to nothing. He said that the IWW (Industrial Workers of the World) and the Communist Party organised the relief workers and protested the conditions in the work camps. He said ironically, the government of the day was a Liberal Government which had promised jobs, jobs, jobs, but which instead chose to force unemployed people into slave labour camps. He said the trek was organised and the relief camp workers rode on top of railway cars to go to Ottawa simply to present their stories to Prime Minister RB Bennett. He said the state was afraid that the movement which had the most strength in British Columbia and Alberta would inspire others and so the RCMP was mobilised to stop the train in Winnipeg. He noted that it was ironic that the general meeting was taking place in Winnipeg. He said that there had been a tremendous strike—the famous Winnipeg General Strike of 1919—and the state was afraid that the trekkers would rekindle the spirit of 1919. The RCMP attacked the trekkers in Winnipeg to suppress the movement. He said that the On to Ottawa Trek still inspired people to take action and many of the social programmes that exist today have roots in the On to Ottawa Trek of 1935. He said someone at the general meeting had observed that the 1990's were like the 1930's only in slow motion. He said things were happening, unemployment is soaring, the Liberal government is destroying social programmes with austerity measures and deficit hysteria. He said students and others had to act. He said the amount of right-wing hysteria has increased, that intolerance had increased, and joblessness has increased. He said Canada is facing an

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era that could make the 1930's look idyllic. He said Canada has a rich working class history, but in fact the struggle against the degradation of working class and working poor people is very rich. He said some people think Canada's history is boring but from 1900 to the 1930's, the history of struggle was rich and diverse. He hoped that the Federation and other social justice groups would be able to reclaim that history, and learn the lessons. He said last year, people said they had not had enough time to organise for January 25, but starting now would provide ample time for the trek to be organised. He thought it would be poetic justice that Winnipeg would be the cite the Federation chose to call for and organise an On to Ottawa Trek. He said all the work that will go into the march will make it successful, not just the march itself. He said for those remaining in the meeting the challenges were great, and he said he was inspired by the fact that despite all the efforts to destroy the meeting, so many delegates chose to stay and continue to very important work of the Federation, and for a better, more just society. He said that for all those reasons, he thought the links between the Trek of 1935 should be linked to the Trek of 1995-96.

- 2. What are the goals of the Block Grant system of funding, what will the Block Grant mean for Federal funding of post-secondary education, what is and what will be the impact of this new method of Federal funding on post-secondary education?
- 3. A discussion of the other areas of Federal funding of post-secondary education including the income tax system through tax credits, the Canadian Student Loan program and potential changes to it, and finally Federal research grants to National University Scholarship Funding Agencies.

Be it further resolved that the Federation invite all stakeholders including national, provincial and local government representatives, faculty representation, community at large representation, social justice groups representation, other student groups representation to attend the National Symposium on Federal Funding of Post-Secondary Education.

A delegate from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said that after January 25, graduate students from Western were really excited about the Canadian Federation of Students. He said there was a sense of excitement and said that at Western there had been a very successful protest and raily and he stressed that the event was successful for the undergraduate student association, since graduate students undertook most of the organising that had been required. He said there was a sense of action and a desire to do more. He said that at the council meeting which followed, the operative question was "what's next". He said there was a strong sense that the one issue which united students was their opposition to the cuts. He said that the proposal for a symposium was designed to address the question of the Federal government's role in post-secondary education. He said this issue united students, and he felt that it was a good next step building on January 25. He said his student association suggested a symposium as a means of challenging the dominant paradigm constructed by the media. He said that a forum would be an opportunity to put forward the Federation's vision of the role of the Federal government in post-secondary education. He said he deeply appreciated the concern that was raised that a forum such as this could lead the Federation to "cow-towe" to the government, to "kiss government butt". He said he did not see this to be the case, rather he saw it as presenting an alternative. He said he had heard that other student associations were considering doing something similar. He said that if the Federation were to take the initiative on organising a forum, then the Federation could control the agenda to ensure that its vision is seen and heard. He said it was important to emphasize that the point of the forum was not to have a discussion about life, death and taxes, but rather for the Federation to say to government in a forum where the Federation controls the agenda. "This is how the Federation sees funding and government involvement in postsecondary education." He said that in that past few days divisions within the Federation have come to the fore, but when all is said and done, the number one reason why students have united is embodied in the motion. He said the motion was an extension of the spirit of January 25, which challenged the prevailing views and challenged the prevailing ideology. He said that for those who worry that the intent of the motion is to move away from action, he said he would not have developed the motion if that was its

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intent. He said that the intent of the motion was to ensure that the Federation did not "cow-towe" to government and that the Federation took control of the agenda. He said that the intent was not to compromise on principles, but rather to present our principles. He said while delegates may be involved in a family argument over this motion, in the end students could stand together on the issue.

Be it resolved that the words "other student groups" be deleted from motion 95/05:57.

The mover said that the Canadian Federation of Students is the only nationally recognized student organisation across Canada. She then withdrew the amendment.

95/05:58 WITHDRAWN

The delegate from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said he appreciated the concern just noted by the previous speaker and clarified that the intention of including "other student groups" was to include such groups as aboriginal student groups.

The chair of the National Graduate Council spoke in favour of the motion. She said those who attended the Income Contingent Loan Repayment Plan Symposium in September of 1994 would know that the Federation was extremely effective in organising to resist the implementation of ICLRP's. She said that for those who may be inclined to feel that symposiums are a waste of time, she said that the experience of the ICLRP forum showed that they can be effective in proving the Federation's case. She said that the Canada Health and Social Transfer will affect faculty, and although they often take positions in opposition to students, she said that in conference settings they support students. She felt that a forum was opportunity to meld with faculty on the issue of funding for post-secondary education. She said it was also important to talk about regional disparities regarding access to post-secondary education. She said that as a graduate student at the University of Dalhousie she knows that Dalhousie tuition is amongst the highest in the country and any future tuition increases will have a grave impact on access in the region. She said that by talking about regional disparities, there would then be an opportunity to push for a national act on post-secondary education. She said that other committees would be making research recommendations, and she felt that a forum would be an excellent place to showcase such research. She urged delegates to support the motion.

City Centre Student Association delegate Harter proposed an amendment.

Be it further resolved that that an additional clause be added to motion 95/05:57 which reads as follows:

Be it further resolved that Federation documents such as Strategy for Change, and the Federation policy manual be the basis for discussion at the symposium.

The Speaker asked for a seconder for the amendment and noted that the proposal was friendly to the mover and seconder of the original motion. She then asked for opposition to including the amendment.

Crowley said the motion had not been budgetted and asked for details such as length of time of the symposium, whether delegate fees would be charged, and other details which might have an impact on the cost.

The delegate from Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said that the recent ICLRP forum had about 450 delegates. He said that many students were there, and it ran for two days. He said financially, the forum did very well. He said that if the symposium were held in Ottawa, there would be a significant reduction in expenses. He said if it were done for two day it would not require high accommodation costs. He said that if the non-student delegates were charged a fee and if students were asked to pay a small fee, then some expenses could be defrayed. He said if local student associations covered the cost of sending delegations to the symposium that would also help. He said that the speakers that would be invited would not cost much since they were the Federation's own people. He said the Federation had Caryn Duncan and other strong Federation researchers who could present the issues. He said the Federation did not have to bring in researchers from Australia, since the Federation had competent analysts who could present the Federation's agenda. He said that other organisations could be approached for funding. He suggested that the symposium could be scheduled to take place in Ottawa right after the Trek when many students and people would already be in Ottawa.

A delegate proposed a substitute motion for motion 95/05:57.

Whereas traditional modes of consultation with government and traditional attempts to gamer media attention have allowed government and media to shape the agenda on post-secondary education; and

Be it resolved that the Federation organise a national symposium on postsecondary education to focus on the role of federal funding for post-secondary education, and on related issues; and

Be it further resolved that the organising of the symposium take into account the objectives of the Federation and the interests of all its coalition partners.

The mover said he noted that the Campaigns Committee had recommended defeat of the proposal and worried that some delegations may still be inclined to defeat the motion. He said that is the rationale for which he proposed a substitute motion. He

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thought that perhaps the wording of the motion contributed to the reticence of delegates to adopt the proposal.

Hansen a delegate from the Simon Fraser Student Society spoke against the motion. He said he had two concerns. He said he did not believe that having government representatives at the Federation's table did not guarantee the Federation having control over the agenda. He did not believe that the government would attend UNLESS they could control the agenda, therefore, in an effort to convince the government to attend, there would be enormous pressure to modify the agenda. He said that he therefore felt the proposal was impractical. He said he did not think that a forum would change the government's mind. He said the symposium seemed to be an "educational" symposium but would be attended by students such as those attending the general meeting. He said he thought those delegates in attendance were well-versed in post-secondary education issues and would be more valuable to send individual grassroots students to the symposium. He said he was strongly opposed to the motion.

A delegate spoke in favour of the motion and responded to the comment that government won't come unless government can shape the agenda. He said that if that were the case then government doesn't come.

95/05:60 DEFEATED

British Columbia Chairperson Michael Gardiner said he was strongly in favour of motion 95/05:57. He said that in the unwritten Young Liberal Handbook of Canada is a statement that what needs to happen is that another national student organisation needs to be created, and that student organisation needs to call a national forum, and that student organisation needs to set the agenda for the Liberal Party using different terminology. He said that if the Federation does not take action and call its own symposium in advance of that Young Liberal Organisation with a different name and pull off the forum and bring together the Canadian Association of University Teachers, the Canadian University Faculty Association, the Colleges-Institutes Educators Association, and all the other coalition partners that the Federation has and needs to hold on to, then the Federation was in danger of losing them. He said it was vitally important that the motion be adopted, organise a forum and prevent Young Liberals from pulling off the forum and weakening the student movement in Canada.

He said that if the report is moved omnibus, he recommended pulling out MEMB 03 since he had an amendment to propose on the motion.

Be it further resolved that provincial components/organisations may distribute the materials more widely, as the provincial component/organisation sees fit;

Be it further resolved that the provincial component/organisations will inform the non-member local student association executives that the Federation is permittings the constituency groups to run the Federation campaigns pertinent to constituency groups on their campuses.

The delegate from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said that the initial intent of the motion was to have provincial components more actively involved in encouraging non-member student associations to participate in campaigns. He said the spirit of this motion and the next motion, is to encourage provincial components to

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contact non-members. He suggested that the Federation could keep in touch with non-members rather than placing the onus on non-members to keep in touch with the Federation. He said it was brought to his attention that this motion could be used detrimentally. He said he recognised the concerns, but asked for amendments that could maintain the spirit of the motions but address the specific concerns noted. He thought that constituency groups in particular may want to become members if they knew more about the kinds of campaigns the Federation was undertaking.

Crowley said he was in favour of the motion but felt a few amendments could clarify the resolutions. He suggested that the a number of grammatical improvements to the resolution as well as a reference to constituency groups in the final clause. There was no opposition to the amendments and were therefore incorporated into the motion [please note bold type and the strikethrough type in motion 95/05:67].

Kapoor, a delegate from the Regina University of Regina Students' Union, explained the reasons that the committee had recommended defeat of the motion. She said one reason was concern that non-members would benefit from the campaigns without ever having to join the Fed Federation.

Lavigne, a delegate from the Concordia Graduate Student Association, spoke against the motion. He said most provincial components, except perhaps British Columbia and Ontario, have limited resources. He was concerned that provincial components would feel obligated to allocate scarce resources to coordinating Federation campaigns on non-member campuses. He also agreed that the motion would reward non-member campuses for their failure to join the Federation. He cited January 25th as an example when the membership saw it prudent to involve non-members in a campaign, however, he did want members to always contact non-member constituency groups. He said the emphasis should be on running effective campaigns on the member campuses and encourage other student associations to join the Federation on the strength of well-organised and effective Federation campaigns.

A point of privilege was raised noting that the British Columbia component did have unlimited resources. She said that British Columbia may have more members and therefore more provincial revenue than other provincial components, she considered British Columbia resources to be limited.

A delegate said that while he supported the spirit of the motion—reaching out to non-members—he had to oppose the motion. He said there was a phrase that applied to the situation "free-rider syndrome".

Crowley spoke in favour of the motion noting that with his previous amendments, there was no reason not to adopt the resolution. He pointed out that the motion was already non-binding, insofar as it "encouraged" provincial components, not directed them. He said that the motion called for the option of distributing materials more widely, not that they have to. He said that the last clause simply asked that constituency groups be informed that they were permitted to run Federation campaigns at their local, not that they HAVE to or that the Federation must run the campaigns. He said the Federation should not mind that non-members get involved with campaigns because constituency groups on non-member campuses would be helping to combat oppression on their campus, and that is what the Federation presumably supports. He therefore urged delegates to support a motion that simply welcomes the participation of constituency group members on non-Federation campuses, to participate in Federation campaigns.

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Harter asked the Speaker to rule the motion redundant, and referred to Standing Resolution 11 regarding the International Students Commissioner. He read the appropriate section:

The International Students Commissioner will act a liaison between the constituency group and the rest of the Fed Federation and will facilitate communication between International Student members of the Federation and non-member associations.

Harter said that since communicating with individual non-members was implicit in Standing Resolution 11 and also for Francophone students in Standing Resolution 10 the intent of motion 95/05:67 is already covered. He said all standing resolutions include a reference to communication with non-members.

The Speaker said she thought the motion 95/05:67 was more broad, asking not just constituency group commissioners to take responsibility for communicating campaigns but the provincial components. She ruled the motion to be in order.

A delegate from the Simon Fraser Student Society noted that the Simon Fraser Student Society would be removing itself as a mover for the motions 95/05:N28 and 95/05:N29.

The delegate from Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students rose on a point of information, asking whether it was in order to ask for movers for both N28 and N29, since the Simon Fraser Student Society had withdrawn its support.

The Speaker suggested that N28 could be re-moved when the motions are considered later.

The Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students delegate suggested that if Simon Fraser Student Society no longer wished to move the motion, then perhaps it should simply be withdrawn.

The Speaker asked for another mover and seconder.

He said that which is appropriate to some non-members may not be appropriate to others. He said he did not believe that a mail-out constituted a membership recruitment strategy. He said that while it may have been effective for January 25, a mail-out may not be effective in all cases. He did not think it prudent to adopt this directive because he did not think it was the best way to utilise staff and National Executive resources.

A delegate spoke against the motion, and said he agreed with the previous speaker. He did not think that a mailing to every campus should be mandated.

A delegate spoke in favour of the motion arguing that a \$.43 stamp for a 200 letter mailing would cost about \$86.00. He said if another \$10.00 were added for photocopying and a few dollars were added for staff time the proposal may cost a whopping \$100.00 odd dollars. He said he did not think this was too great an expense but might actually help recruit new members.

A delegate from the Capilano Student Society spoke in favour of the motion and suggested that each member local be encouraged to forward the information to non-members in their area.

A delegate from the Malaspina Students Union suggested an amendment that limited the mailing to no more than a few pages.

The Speaker asked if the proposal was considered friendly to the mover and seconder. It was not considered friendly and the Speaker asked for a seconder for the amendment. No seconder was forthcoming.

A delegate said that while it might not cost a huge amount to do a mailing, nevertheless the argument still stands that some non-members require different treatment, and a mailing cannot provide for any differentiation between non-member student associations.

Hansen, a delegate from the Simon Fraser Student Society spoke against the motion. He said he has often received mail from different organisations and such mail did not cause him to want to join the organisation. He did not think it was an effective strategy and urged delegates to save trees and defeat the motion.

A delegate spoke in favour of the motion. She said it was a good idea to contact non-member, but also thought that the wording was vague and did not clearly indicate what the content of the mailing should be.

Lavigne, a delegate from Local 83 (Concordia Graduate Student Association) spoke against the motion. He said he recognised the intent of the motion, but pointed out that over the past 18 months, there have been many developments concerning Quebec membership. He said that two student associations had taken out full membership within the Federation, there was a concomitant development of the Quebec Component, and an improvement in the relations between Federation members and non members in Quebec. He said that Federation members worked with non members on January 25th and that a new student Federation had been established as a result of the efforts of the student coalition. He said that better mechanisms presently exist than that which existed at the time the motion was drafted. He said he did not believe this resolution adequately addressed membership recruitment in Quebec. He thought the members of the Quebec component were best situated to develop membership recruitment strategies.

Crowely, a delegate from the McGill Post-Graduate Student Society, spoke against the motion. He said that in Quebec, the situation was very much in flux. He said that opportunities do exist for membership development but he said he was not convinced that the resolution addressed the opportunity. He said that the motion, by stipulating that student associations receiving an invitation had to be autonomous meant that those student associations the Federation may wish to attract would be excluded from the motion.

The delegate from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said the motion came up originally in response to Quebec students. He said that if the worst thing that could happen is that the students association might say "no" then it does not seem to be such a bad motion. He said the best case scenario is that some may say "yes". He therefore said there was nothing to lose by supporting the motion.

A delegate from the Laurentian Students' General Assembly said too many scarce resources were being redirected into referenda. He said that his local had virtually been without a fieldworker because she had to spend most of her time fighting referenda. He said there was concern that the process for withdrawing from the Federation was being abused.

Crowley said the motion was a directive but did not seem to be aimed at anyone in particular. He said he was not sure whether a directive could be adopted to just "create" a bylaw, since that presumes the necessary 2/3 support of plenary at a future general meeting.

Mancinelli said that all directives go to the National Executive and is therefore implicit in the motion. He said that the committee wanted to support the motion which would then put the onus on the National Executive to draft the appropriate bylaw proposal and ensure that it is submitted in accordance with the procedures outlined in the bylaws.

A Capilano delegate spoke against the motion. She said she understood the sentiment behind the motion, but pointed out that not all institutions operate on a four year programme. She said her executive changes every year if not every six months.

Crowley stood on a point of order. He said it was out of order because the National Executive was not the body that creates bylaws.

Temelini said that the motion simply mandated the National Executive to draft the appropriate bylaw proposal.

The Speaker said that the National Executive has the right to submit notice of a bylaw amendment.

Malaspina spoke in favour of the motion and suggested the word "proposed" be added before the word bylaw, to ensure that the intent is clear.

The Speaker declared the proposal to be a friendly amendment.

A delegate from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said he supported the spirit of the motion but not the motion as worded. He was concerned that the resolution could be construed as the National Executive attempting to limit democracy. He did not think the National Executive should be responsible for making the proposal. He thought it would be much better for the proposal to come directly from a member local. He suggested that the motion be defeated but that the movers of the motion be encouraged to draft the appropriate bylaw proposal.

A delegate from Malaspina said she understood the concern, however, she thought a motion that was supported by a majority of member locals which called on their National Executive to draft a bylaw proposal could not be construed as being a top down political manoeuvre.

A delegate said he had been convinced by the argument from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students. He said he wholeheartedly supported the intent, but agreed it would be politically more astute were it to come from a member local.

A delegate from the University of Regina Students' Union said she had been convinced by the arguments from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students, and withdrew their second.

Concordia Graduate Student Association seconded the motion.

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Lavigne said he was NOT convinced by the arguments from Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students but suggested that the motion be tabled until the issue of defederation arises in the report of the Organisational Development Committee.

Layigne said he was pleased that plenary was debating, discussing, and asking questions about the future of Federation programmes. He said that the in depth discussions regarding CFSNet, the Canadian Programming Service, and the Federation's communications strategy has been extremely fruitful. He said he is happy to move on to a full-blown discussion of the Health Network. He said he supported the motion for a number of important reasons. He said there has been confusion regarding the state of the health plans and that a myth has been wrongly perpetuated that the health plans are in jeopardy. He said the health plans are not in jeopardy. He said that the only thing that has changed is the proportion of revenue realised by the Federation. He said that the authority of the Federation with respect to the health plan operated in its name had been established by little more than a handshake agreement with an agent of record. He said that all the health plans that exist with Teleski and Sunlife will move ahead. He said the only thing that has to be determined at the local level is whether the local goes with Teleski or the Federation's new broker. He said that the Federation should pursue its own broker and ensure its authority over the health plan through a written contract. He said the National Executive is making the pursuit of a new broker a top priority. He also said that a number of locals have already committed their loyalty to the Federation's new broker and agreed to take whatever steps were required toward that goal. He said he was fantastically optimistic about the Federation's health plan and strongly supported the motion.

He said that the Simon Fraser Student Society did not agree to enter into a health plan with Brad Teleski, but rather agreed to enter into a health plan run and administered by Canadian Federation of Students-Services. He said the motion addresses his local's concern.

Harter said he had been taken aback by previous comments which implied that the most important issue is the portion of revenue realised by the Federation from the health plans. He said he thought there were other issues that were more important. He said he also did not think the Federation should be profiting from the ill-health of students. He said he agreed with the comments expressed by the Simon Fraser Student Society. He said that the health plan was introduced to compensate for the inadequacies of the health coverage provided by government. He said he was disgusted by the notion that the Federation would profit from the health plan. He said he had been under the impression that the health plan was run on a cost-recovery basis and that if that weren't the case he found it unethical and deplorable.

Crowley (McGill Post-Graduate Student Society) said that having participated on Budget Committee and being on the Travel CUTS board, he could respect the opinions expressed but did not agree. He said that the Federation runs a health plan which is available to non-member locals. He said the Federation runs a health plan to benefit students. He said that the Federation's health plan is available to students at a lower rate than other health plans, in the same way that Travel CUTS sells flight tickets at a better rate for students than offered by other travel agencies. He said that did not preclude making a profit. He said that any revenue generated by the health plan has allowed the Federation to subsidise other Federation services which the Federation would not have been able to maintain. He said he understood the sentiment expressed, but if all Federation programmes were run on a cost-recovery basis, then the Federation wouldn't be able to continue to offer the programmes that are important but which actually lose money for the Federation.

A delegate from Simon Fraser Student Society said she was disgusted to find out during Budget Committee that the health plan was not run on a cost-recovery basis. She said that it was erroneous to compare Travel CUTS which sells travel and vacations both of which can be optional for students, whereas the health plan effectively peddles health which is not optional for students. She urged delegates to support the amendment. She said the Federation should live by the ideals it is trying to convince others to live by.

A delegate from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students supported the amendment. He said it was important to distinguish between the importance of health and the importance of travel. He asked whether the Federation would be opposed to private, for profit insurance on principle. He said that the Federation should recognise the inherent contradiction should the amendment be defeated.

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A delegate from the York Graduate Students' Association said he opposed the amendment, not because he believed that profits should be made from people's ill-health, but because the modest portion of revenue generated from the plan funds other programmes. He said that the financial situation is serious enough to warrant a recommendation from Budget Committee to cancel the May 1996 general meeting. He said that in the coming year, there was virtually no chance that a profit would be garnered from the health plan.

Story (Guelph Central Student Association) spoke in favour of the motion. She said she agreed that it was a problem to compare the profit from Travel CUTS to the profit from the health plan. She said that her understanding is that Canadian Federation of Students-Services is a not-for-profit, non-share capital corporation which runs the health plans and other programmes, some of which are subsidised while others are not. She said that therefore, the Federation is not profiting in the same sense as say, Sunlife, but rather that revenue from one service programme is redirected into another quality service which is also needed by the individual members of the Federation.

The delegate from Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said he was opposed to the motion since the opinion that would be expressed would be a strong opinion not unlike the deficit hysteria identified earlier.

Koenen stood on a point of privilege. She said she had been out of the room during the health plan debate and she did not think it fair that the delegate insinuated she would be engaging in deficit hysteria.

The delegate from Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students stood to apologise and said he was unaware that the National Treasurer had been out of the room.

Koenen said she did not think it was the purview of this body to determine the profit level of the health plans. She said that commission rates were set by the broker and that she was not sure which broker would agree not to make any revenue. She said the real debate which is within the purview of plenary is not about the existance of profit but rather whether the broker would realise all the profit or whether the Federation and the broker would share the revenue, which would in turn allow the Federation to subsidise such programmes as Studentsaver, the Canadian Programming Service and the CESNet.

Harter raised a point of order stating that the National Treasurer had implied that her comment would not reflect one side or the other of the current debate.

The Speaker disagreed stating that the National Treasurer had made a valid point of privilege asking the delegate not to second guess what her contribution would be.

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Harter (Local 73) said he was in favour of the amendment. He said the issue was not about giving the broker more money. He said he felt that a broker could be found who would be willing to attach her/his name and run the programme on a cost-recovery basis. He said his understanding was that one reason why health plans are offered to students is that it benefits the insurance company in the future, because the insurance company name gets exposure. He said the crux of the matter was not how the profit is spent but rather that any profit is made from the ill-health of the students.

Crowely (McGill Post-Graduate Student Society) said that the health plan provides a service. He said that the service was not "good health" but rather, insurance. He said that health insurance is bought by students, not just sick students but also healthy students. He noted that it is because revenue is provided by healthy students that health care can be provided to unhealthy students. He said that the healthy students subsidise the unhealthy students. He said that the whole premise of insurance is based on a calculation of the ratio of potentially healthy students to potentially unhealthy students, of a potential cost of health care provided and an evaluation of an appropriate insurance payment. He said the Federation provides the collection of students, not the insurance. He said that the Federation take the collection of students to a broker who then provides the insurance. He said the broker who arranges the insurance requires a certain amount of commission. He said one way or another, profit will be made. He said that depending on the numbers of students and the negotiating ability of the Federation a small commission can be arranged to be paid from the broker's commission to the Federation, as a form of commission on the business the Federation brings to the broker. The Federation then uses the commission from the broker to subsidise the other essential services offered by Canadian Federation of Students-Services such that, at the end of the day, no profit is made. He said that from a Budget Committee point of view, the health plan has been subsidising Studentsaver cards and other services. He said that if the proposal is to eliminate the health plan revenue, then the proposal is also about layoffs in the Ottawa office, cancelling general meetings and other drastic measures. He urged delegates to be pragmatic and defeat the motion. He said it would be great for the Federation if, one day, the Federation set itself up as a broker and actually sold insurance. He said currently the Federation can only market a plan and acts as the go-between between a broker and a body of students.

A delegate from Capilano Students' Society stood on a point of order. She asked the Speaker to rule on whether the debate was more about policy than a directive. She said she supported the principle of the motion but also did not want to sacrifice the well-being of the Federation. She suggested that it would be more appropriate to move the appropriate policy proposal where it could be discussed at the committee level.

The Speaker agreed that the amendment should be a policy, not a directive.

A delegate from the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said he was concerned that after having spent a significant amount of time debating the motion that the effort would be for naught since the amendment was going to be ruled out of order. He wondered how, unless some other political forces were at work, this motion could have been allowed consume so much plenary time if it were truly out of order.

The delegate from Capilano Students' Society stood on a point of privilege. She said she was sorry to not have been more "on the ball." She said she was quite tired and it did not strike her as being out of order earlier.

Temelini said that the ruling was not determining that the plenary had no right to make the decision, the ruling is that the motion properly belongs in the policy manual under Operations Policies of the Federation. The ruling is that the amendment should be

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moved as policy. He said that plenary can adopt the motion as interim policy with a two-thirds majority and at the next general meeting the motion could be entrenched as policy.

Harter said he two points of order. He said if the Speaker has made a ruling then why is a member of the National Executive defending the ruling. He said his second point was directed at the member of the National Executive who is acting as the speaker whose ruling was being challenged. He said the directive would be referred to the next Organisational Development Committee and therefore should be in order. He said he thought the National Executive should not be preventing the plenary from directing the National Executive. He said that if the National Executive member was suggesting that he was totally fascist.

Temelini stood on a point of personal privilege and said he thought the previous speaker's comments were out of order...

Harter said he thought Temelini was out of order...

Temelini said he was not a fascist and that the speaker should withdraw his remarks.

03.16 pm—the meeting recessed.

03.27 pm—the meeting reconvened.

The Speaker called the meeting back to order. The Speaker asked the delegates to make and effort to maintain decorum during the plenary session.

Harter apologised for having called National Executive member Temelini a fascist. He said he was very sorry for having gotten away. He said he still stood on his original point of order, that the Speaker was being manipulated by the National Executive. He said such behaviour was not fascist just contrary to plenary procedure.

The Speaker suggested that the amendment be considered separately from the main motion. She suggested that motion 95/05:91 be considered immediately and amending motion 95/05:93 be considered after the Budget Committee Report is considered.

She said some concern had been raised about an article on Northern Ireland, which talked about the beautiful castles, the countryside and cathedrals, while it failed to note anything about the British occupation.

The Speaker suggested that the motion be tabled until the wording could be improved. The suggestion was adopted by consensus.

A delegate spoke against the motion and in favour of the Student Advocate. She said the Student Advocate was an underused resource that should not be eliminated but rather that member locals be encouraged to contribute to it. She said she had been part of the Campaigns Committee which was recommending that two pages of the advocate be devoted to coverage of the January 25 Day of Strike and Action.

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A delegate from the McGill Post-Graduate Student Society asked why there were no committee recommendations on the new motions proposed in the report of the Membership Development and Communications Committee.

Be it resolved that the information contained in the Services and Action Updates be combined into one Federation publication in a format for distribution to all individual members of the Federation; and

Be it further resolved that short-term updates on information contained in the Action Update be distributed on a more frequent basis by a fax-out method.

Mancinelli explained that the intent of the motion was to combine the publications into one Federation Update, to be produced and distributed in the same format in which the Services Update is produced, which is a user friendly document that is well laid-out and can be distributed to the membership as a whole. He said the Action Update is currently distributed by fax, and the committee felt that practice should continue. He said the intent is to have two publications for the Federation, one distributed about 4 times per year in a comprehensive, well-thought out, well-prepared and well-produced format and it would be available to all individual members of the Federation. He said the other publication would be a more frequently produced Action Update, distributed by fax every two to three weeks which would include short-term updates on the Federation.

Kemper (Emily Carr Students' Union) supported the motion. She said she had been organising students for a few years. She said the Student Advocate came out about twice per year which was inadequate to fully accomplish its original mandate. She said she liked the format used by the Action Canada Network update which was short, concise and to the point. She said that this motion should not be seen as destroying the Student Advocate but rather as changing the format to be as effective as possible.

Harter (City Centre Student Association) said he did not think that the motion called for a simple formatting change. He said the motion was advocating a content change, which

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was to fuse advocacy work and programmes information into one document. He said that while the Student Advocate clearly lacked vision, he said it had the potential to become a useful publication, perhaps even the alternative national student newspaper. He said he did not think it prudent to eliminate the Advocate just because it failed to meet its potential, he said the debate should focus on improving the content and quality of the newspaper. He said that a political and analytical newspaper did not lend itself to service programme articles and would reduce the effectiveness by which all issues were addressed. He asked whether political students would really be interested in cheap fares to Hawaii, or whether the titles would be more like: "You've heard about the revolution in Mexico—now you can visit!" He said he was speaking against the motion. He said that the Advocate could be a mechanism to organise students for the On to Ottawa Trek. He said students needed an alternative student paper now more than ever and that is where the Federation's resources should be put. He said he didn't think that a regular fax would lend itself to distribution on the scale required for effective organising.

A delegate from the Simon Fraser Student Society spoke against the motion. She said that as President of the Simon Fraser Student Society she could not fathom how she would be able to get the faxed out information out to students. She said she therefore thought the fax-out idea was stupid. She said she was concerned about moving to a new format without actually seeing what the new format will be like.

Bollerup (Students' Union of Nova Scotia College of Art and Design) said she liked the amendment but also liked the Student Advocate. She said she thought the design could be improved and that it could come out more often but did not want to vote on the amendment if it meant voting against the Advocate.

A point of order was raised. The delegate pointed out that if the amendment were adopted it necessarily means that the debate would be postponed until the next national general meeting after the proposed format is approved.

The Speaker said that the amendment directed the National Executive to present a draft format in November, but that the actual debate would still be entertained when debate resumed on the main motion.

Lavigne (Concordia Graduate Student Association) said he was opposed to the amendment because he disagreed with waiting until November before moving forward on fusing the two publications. He said that if motion 95/05:103 were adopted then the new format could be assessed much more concretely. He said that until a format is actually tested it is purely a matter of opinion as to which format is better so the debate would be very abstract.

She said the committee wanted a variety of information to be made available in the same user-friendly style as the Services Update, but also wanted to continue keeping locals informed through more frequent Action Updates in the current fax format. She said the committee agreed that a distinction should be made within the publication between advocacy work and services work of the Federation. She said the overwhelming sentiment of the committee was that the Advocate was not well-read and therefore this motion is intended to address the concerns.

A delegate asked whether, by supporting this motion, the plenary was being asked to make a decision on the Student Advocate.

The Speaker said that motion 95/05:103 was calling for the fusion of the Services Update and the Action Update into one publication. She said discussion regarding the Student Advocate will be revisited after motion 95/05:103 was resolved

He said if a member local cannot, on a usual basis, remit Federation fees before the spring then that would not constitute "deliberately". He said that some members intentionally withhold fees and there should be a mechanism to resolve such situations.

Koenen (National Treasurer) said the motion was intended to refer to delinquent members who, to date, have not yet paid a dime of their Federation fees. She said she supported the motion because it was clearly intended to address those member locals who take the money which belongs to all the members of the Federation, invest the money and collect the interest. Such approval cannot be gained until such time as the proposed amendment is available in both official languages by a vote of the member locals according to the following procedure:
- i. three (3) weeks after a General Meeting, the National Executive shall send a list of policies to be approved to all voting member associations:
- ii. the member associations shall take and record a vote of their Council and inform the National Executive within five (5) weeks of the mailing date of the list of policies. Non-response by member locals will not be counted in the final results; and
- iii. should two thirds (2\3) of the member Councils vote in the affirmative, the proposed policy shall become the official policy of the Federation

Harter (City Centre Student Association) spoke against the motion. He said the motion denied members of the Francophone Constituency Group the right to vote at their own meeting. He said section 3 of Standing Resolution 10 defined membership: "members

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of the constituency group are all Francophone or fluently French speaking members of the Federation who are delegates at a general meeting of the Federation. He said section 5 of Standing Resolution 10 outlined the rights of non-constituency group members.

A delegate suggested that the motion be amended to include the words "all non-Federation members" to make it more clear.

Lavigne said the intent of the motion is to change the voting structure within the constituency group. He said presently, every individual member of the constituency group is entitled to vote; this motion would provide only one vote per students' union. He said he was speaking neither in favour nor opposed to the motion since it would be up to the members of the constituency group make such a decision.

A delegate said that if that were the case, then the motion is not clearly worded. She said it read as if the individual members were going to be denied a vote.

Harter (City Centre Student Association) rose on a point of order. He read from the constitution of the Francophone Students' Constituency Group:

Should any clause of this [Francophone Students' Constituency Group] constitution contradict or conflict with the Constitution of the Federation, the latter shall prevail.

This constitution shall only be repealed or amended by the vote of at least 2/3 of the voting members institutions present at a general meeting of the Federation upon the recommendation of the Francophone Students Constituency Group.

He asked that the motion be tabled until a recommendation can be made.

A delegate from Camosun College Student Society said the Campaigns Committee is currently responsible for doing the work outlined in the proposal. He thought the proposal would create too much duplication.

Lavigne (Local 83) spoke against the motion. He said that the political terrain changes so rapidly in the arena of federal politics that a strategy developed 18 months before the election could be out-of-date at the time of the actual election. He said he thought that the good work of the committee may wind up being wasted. He said the emphasis should be organising at the local level on an ongoing basis so that the membership is ready when an election is called.

Galinger (Trent Central Student Government) said the motion was not proposing to duplicate the work of the Campaigns Committee, but rather to focus on a specific aspect of campaigns and relieve the Campaigns Committee of that work at election time.

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Gardiner (British Columbia Chairperson) said that if the motion was going to be adopted, then the adjective "Federal" should be added into the wording of the motion.

The suggestion was adopted as a friendly amendment.

Harter (City Centre Student Association) spoke against the motion. He said the motion placed far too high a priority—especially monetarily—on an election readiness committee. He said the Campaigns Committee was asked to develop plans for a variety of campaigns for a cost of only \$19,000.00. He said the motion also implied that the Federation did not do lobby work on a day to day basis, but only made a concerted effort once every three to five years. He said he did not want to allocate \$10,000.00 to what could turn out to be an "election readiness debating committee".

Be it resolved that one of the two legal entities- the Canadian Federation of Students or the Canadian Federation of Students-Services - be dissolved and its assets be transferred to the remaining legal entity prior to the next General Meeting;

Be it further resolved that all required legal and/or contractual obligations be carried out including but not limited to the Canada Corporations Act:

Be it further resolved that the name used externally and internally be Canadian Federation of Students.

Lavigne said the committee recommended the substitute motion for the following reasons. He said that first reason is that it made very little difference which legal entity was wrapped up and assets transferred. He said the National Executive was being given the authority to dissolve a legal entity and transfer its assets. He said it would be up to the National Executive to asses which legal entity would be the most appropriate legal entity to be wrapped up. He said it could be that it is best to wind up the Canadian Federation of Students and transfer all its assets to the Canadian Federation of Students-Services.

Temelini spoke in favour of the motion. He said it had taken his five years of involvement within the Federation to fully comprehend how the organisation worked. He said the confusion that is exacerbated as a result of there being two legal entities but one and the same membership diminishes the democracy within the organisation. He said having two entities promotes gross unaccountability, and runs contrary to the vision set out at the founding national general meeting of the Federation—a vision for one national student federation that offers a variety of services such as lobbying, student discounts, speakers, campaigns, and research. He said if members agree that a clear, accessible democratic structure maximizes participation within the organisation, then they should support the motion. He said that in practice, the Federation is one organisation and the legal structure should reflect that reality. He said that despite the naysayers predicting dire consequences for the organisation, the only effect winding up one legal structure will have is to eliminate an obstacle to participation and democracy within the organisation. He said all that will remain will be one legal entity which owns and operates a travel company. He said he would be honoured to be a participant at

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the national general meeting where the Federation realised the founding vision set out in 1981.

He said that the winding up motion is important, but motion 95/05:228 is important, especially for Students of Colour.

The Speaker ruled that the previous motion was out of order and asked Salemy to motivate motion 95/05:228.

He said that in British Columbia the percentage is higher: 30%. He said that racism must be challenged both inside and outside the Federation. Whereas working class/working poor people need to represent themselves and are traditionally marginalised in society and are marginalised within the Federation as participation in student unions is more difficult for the working class/working poor because of requirements for maintaining loans, threat of timely completion, the need for full and part-time jobs, parental responsibilities and lack of adequate remuneration; and

Whereas socio-economic injustice must be addressed; therefore

Be it resolved that the following standing resolution be created:

STANDING RESOLUTION #15-WORKING CLASS/WORKING POOR STUDENTS CONSTITUENCY GROUP

The following shall be the goals, the membership and general constitutional provisions of the Working Class/Working Poor Students Constituency Group formulated in accordance with Bylaw VIII.

The constituency group shall be funded as determined in the annual budget of the Federation approved by the membership at each semi-annual meeting:

1. Name

The organisation shall be known as the Working Class/Working Poor Students Constituency Group.

2. Objectives

The objectives of the constituency group shall be:

- a) to promote the principles and purposes of the Federation;
- b) to promote communication and cooperation between working class/working poor student groups in post-secondary institutions across Canada:
- c) to provide a forum for Working Class/working poor students to meet and discuss class issues, exchange information,

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- experiences and share ideas regarding issues facing working class/working poor students;
- d) to facilitate communication between working class/working poor and other students, and to work in solidarity and cooperation with other Federation constituency groups;
- e) to create awareness of the working class issues and advocate destruction of classist structures within the Federation and at College and at university campuses;
- f) to fight against overt and institutionalised classism that permeates post-secondary institutions; and
- g) to organise a cohesive resistance to all structures that perpetuate the exploitation, degradation and dehumanisation of working class/working poor students.
- 3. Membership

Membership of the constituency group shall include all working class/working poor members of the Federation who are delegates at a General Meeting of the Federation and choose to be members.

4. Rights of Members

All members of the constituency group are entitled to:

- a) attend any caucus or committee and speak to any matter or motion that may arise;
- b) vote at any caucus or committee meeting;
- c) nominate any member to be one of the working class/working poor co-commissioners.
- 5. Rights of Non-members

Working Class/Working Poor students who are present at the constituency group but are not members of the Federation have all the rights afforded to members except the right to vote in committee meetings.

6. Meetings of the Constituency Group

Meetings of the Constituency Group may take place at a general meeting of the Federation at which members of the Constituency Group are present. Meetings of the constituency group shall take place by word of mouth and/or in print.

7. Working Class/Working Poor Students Commissioner

Duties of the Commissioner shall be: to facilitate the implementation of campaigns and lobbying decided upon by the constituency group. The commissioner shall act as a spokesperson of the Working Class/Working Poor constituency group on National Issues. The Commissioner shall prepare brief semi-annual reports including information about campaigns, activities and goals pertaining to the constituency to be sent to local working class/ working poor student organisations and

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member associations. The Commissioner shall also facilitate communication with non-members.

8. Constitutional provisions

Should any clause of this constitution contradict or conflict with the Constitution of the Federation, the latter shall prevail. This constitution shall only be repealed or amended by a vote of at least two-thirds of the voting member associations present at a general meeting of the Federation.

Be it further resolved that all following standing resolutions be renumbered accordingly.

The delegate from Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said this standing resolution was a long time coming and strongly urged delegates to support the motion.

D. Quorum

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Quorum for the vote shall be that of the member local association or five percent (5%) of the individual members of the local association, whichever is higher.

E. Administering the Campaign and Voting

The vote shall be overseen by a committee comprised of two (2) members appointed by the Federation and two (2) members appointed by member local association.

The committee shall be responsible for:

- i) deciding the number and location of polling stations;
- ii)approving all materials to be distributed during the campaign;
- iii)deciding the ballot question;
- iv)overseeing the ballot;
- v)counting ballots;
- vi)adjudicating all appeals; and
- vii)establishing all other rules and regulations for the vote.

In the event of a committee deadlock an independent Ombudsperson, unanimously retained to make the final ruling, as pertaining to the decisions of the committee.

STANDING RESOLUTION #15-WORKING CLASS/WORKING POOR STUDENTS CONSTITUENCY GROUP

The following shall be the goals, the membership and general constitutional provisions of the Working Class/Working Poor Students Constituency Group formulated in accordance with Bylaw VIII.

The constituency group shall be funded as determined in the annual budget of the Federation approved by the membership at each semi-annual meeting:

1. Name

The organisation shall be known as the Working Class/Working Poor Students Constituency Group.

2. Objectives

The objectives of the constituency group shall be:

- a) to promote the principles and purposes of the Federation;
- b) to promote communication and cooperation between working class/working poor student groups in post-secondary institutions across Canada:
- c) to provide a forum for Working Class/working poor students to meet and discuss class issues, exchange information,

- d) to facilitate communication between working class/working poor and other students, and to work in solidarity and cooperation with other Federation constituency groups;
- e) to create awareness of the working class issues and advocate destruction of classist structures within the Federation and at College and at university campuses;
- f) to fight against overt and institutionalised classism that permeates post-secondary institutions;
- g) to organise a cohesive resistance to all structures that perpetuate the exploitation, degradation and dehumanisation of working class/working poor students;

3. Membership

Membership of the constituency group shall include all working class/working poor members of the Federation who are delegates at a General Meeting of the Federation and choose to be members.

4. Rights of Members

All members of the constituency group are entitled to:

- a) attend any caucus or committee and speak to any matter or motion that may arise;
- b) vote at any caucus or committee meeting;
- c) nominate any member to be one of the working class/working poor co-commissioners.

5. Rights of Non-members

Working Class/Working Poor students who are present at the constituency group but are not members of the Federation have all the rights afforded to members except the right to vote in committee meetings.

6. Duties of the Commissioner shall be:

The Working Class/Working Poor Students Commissioner shall facilitate the implementation of campaigns and lobbying decided upon by the constituency group. The commissioner shall act as a spokesperson of the Working Class/Working Poor constituency group on National Issues. The Commissioner shall prepare brief semi-annual reports including information about campaigns, activities and goals pertaining to the constituency to be sent to local working class/ working poor student organisations and member associations. The Commissioner shall also facilitate communication with non-members.

8. Constitutional provisions

Should any clause of this constitution contradict or conflict with the Constitution of the Federation, the latter shall prevail. This constitution shall only be repealed or amended by a vote of at

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least two-thirds of the voting member associations present at a general meeting of the Federation.

- ii. Notice of the vote must include the exact dates and times of voting.
- iii. In the case of a withdrawal referendum incorporating a mail-out coomponent, the exact date of the referendum shall be the date that the ballots are mailed to the individual members:
- iv. Failure to adhere to the notice provisions in article A i), ii) and iii) shall invalidate the results of the vote.

b. Campaigning

- i. There shall be no less than two (2) weeks of campaigning immediately preceding the voting during which time classes are in session.
- ii. Only individual members of the member local association and representatives, representatives of the Federation and representatives of other Federation member local associations shall be permitted to participate in the campaign.

c. Voting

- i. Voting will be conducted at voting stations or, subject to the agreement of the Federation, at a general meeting of the member local association or a mailout ballot.
- ii. There shall be no less than sixteen (16) hours of polling over no less than two (2) days, except in the case of voting being conducted at a general meeting.
- iii. In the event that polling is conducted at a general meeting, representatives of the Federation and Federation member local associations shall be extended full speaking rights in the meeting.

d. Quorum

Quorum for the vote shall be that of the member local association or five percent (5%) of the individual members of the local association, whichever is higher.

e. Administering the Campaign and Voting

The vote shall be overseen by a committee comprised of two (2) members appointed by the Federation and two (2) members appointed by the member local association. The committee shall be responsible for:

- i. deciding the manner of voting, be that by referendum, general meeting or a mail-out ballot.
- ii. deciding the number and location of polling stations;
- iii. approving all materials to be distributed during the campaign;

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iv. deciding the ballot question;

v. overseeing the voting;

vi. counting ballots;

vii. adjudicating all appeals; and,

viii. establishing all other rules and regulations for the vote.

f. Advance Remittance of Outstanding Membership Fees In addition to Articles A to E, in order for a de-federation referendum to proceed, a member local association must remit all outstanding Federation fees not less than six (6) weeks prior to the date of the referendum.

Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students/Laurentían Students' General Assembly

Be it resolved that the following article, g) be added to the bylaw amendment in motion 95/05:266:

> g) Minimum Period Between De-Federating Votes In addition to articles a) through f) in order for a de-federation referendum to take place the member local may not hold a defederation referendum within the previous twenty-four (24) months.

The delegate from Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students said that most points regarding such an amendment had been made. He said that the executive of the Ryerson Students' Union had just conducted a de-federation referendum in the spring of 1995. He said the membership voted decisively to maintain their membership in the Federation. He said the local executive was completely disregarding the wishes of the membership and had served notice that yet another de-federation vote will be conducted in 1996. He said such actions were clearly dilatory, and should be addressed.

A delegate spoke against the motion, and said that because some colleges and institutes have membership that turns on a frequent basis, the amendment would unduly restrict their ability to decide on Federation membership.

A delegate also spoke against the motion, although she agreed with the spirit of the motion. She said the initiative should come from the local and not be imposed by the Federation.

A delegate from Malaspina supported the motion and said that membership in the Federation also involves responsibility to the students across the country with whom the local federates. She said it is undemocratic for one member local to hold frequent referenda since it wastes the collective resources of the Federation.

The mover said the motion was intended to address the concerns of individual members at the Western Ontario Society of Graduate Students. He said most student representatives are in their positions for one or two years. He said that if the motion

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was not adopted, he would like to hear the debate so that he can take the comments back to his local.

Clarke (Simon Fraser Student Society) spoke against the motion. She said the Federation has a democratic process through which people are elected to positions within the Federation. She said that when individuals are put forward for positions, those voting will consider all factors before determining their vote. She said the motion suggests that those who vote within the Federation cannot be trusted to elect the best people for the position. She said the motion also infringes on provincial decision-making processes, noting that provincial National Executive members are elected in accordance with provincial bylaws.

A delegate from Malaspina said the student movement is not plagued by those who stay involved for "too long," but rather the challenge facing the student movement is the distinct lack of continuity. She said it is useful for the Federation to have people who have experience and expertise to bring to the position. She said that people should not be prevented from voting for the candidate of their choice just because that person may have been "involved for too long."

A delegate spoke in favour of the spirit of the motion. He said that one of the concerns raised by those delegates who walked out of the meeting was that they felt some members of the National Executive had been "involved for too long." He said that people should not be able to make a career out of the student movement. He said that because the motion did not reflect that spirit, but rather limited the rights of members to vote for whomever they consider the best candidate, he would speak against the motion.

Harter (City Centre Student Association) spoke against the motion. He said he was not convinced that the resources of Federation were best served by creating a full-time National Treasurer. He was not convinced the Federation could afford the increased cost, and if it could, he said he would prefer to see a more political position created.

Malaspina spoke in favour of the motion. She said the financial workload was substantial. She said given the high expectations for the accountability of the National Treasurer to the membership and the high level of expertise demanded by the membership, she said it would be essential for the position to be full-time.

Lavigne said that the rationale for not referring this motion to the Organisational Development Committee was that it had been recommended by that committee several times. He said this motion, along with many other Organisational Development Committee motions had not been adopted because it never made it to plenary floor.

Temelini said that a National Treasurer was required to ensure accountability. He said most member locals had a full-time treasurer position because it was essential to have a democratically elected person in place to monitor the finances and ensure that financial decisions reflect the political priorities of the membership. He suggested that the references to "services" were replaced by the word "programmes."

The Speaker declared the suggestion to be a friendly amendment.

Harter said he was concerned that a full-time National Treasurer might encompass work of the bargaining unit.

Temelini said that the new elected position would not infringe on the work of the Financial Coordinator in the Ottawa National Office.

Report of the Travel CUTS Board of Directors

Patrick Crowley, an at-large member of the Travel CUTS Board of Directors elected by plenary, presented the report. He referred to the written report of the Travel CUTS Board which includes a list of motions adopted by the Board. He said the CUTS point score, as awarded March 31, 1995 was included in the report. He said the maximum point score was 30 and said that CUTS' point score was for the nine month period ending on March 31. He said that the International Association of Travel Agencies (IATA) perform a score rating on a travel company at any time. He said that 15 points is the minimum acceptable, and noted that CUTS has often scored below 15. He said that the score should increase to at least 17 by the end of the fourth quarter, which is CUTS' best season. He said the Board resolved to create a 'strategic planning sub-committee' and that it had only met once since the motion was adopted. He said it had been difficult to allocate the necessary staff resources to undertake the study and consequently the report of the committee was not available as he had initially hoped it would be. He said staff resources had been allocated and expected work to commence within 10 days. He said a report should be available for the November National General Meeting. He noted that an 'ad-hoc committee on CUTS/FEDERATION profile' had been established. He said that José François, the other elected at-large member of the Board, sent his regrets for being unable to attend the general meeting.

Temelini asked for potential timelines for the implementation of the resolutions adopted. He also asked for the position of the Board regarding the winding-up of one Federation legal entity.

Crowley said that in the past, CUTS offices had been opened in order to maximize access to the student market. He said this goal had largely been accomplished and noted that the only places where CUTS offices were not opened were either in locations which would not be financially viable, or where other means existed to reach the same market. He said in that context, the Board had discussed the future of the company, and where to go next. He said that 60% of all CUTS revenue is generated from student sales, and those sales are dependent on student discount agreements negotiated with the airlines. He said the Board's goal was to minimize CUTS' dependence on agreements with airlines. He said that for the past five years, the "brown ticket deals" have generated revenue for both CUTS and the airline, but there was no guarantee that the agreements would be negotiable every year into the future. He said the strategic planning committee would be considering these issues. He said it was imperative to have a proper debate on the level of share recapitalisation, and a report was necessary to facilitate the debate. He said it has been difficult to get access to all necessary information and said it was urgent to have the report ready by the November National general meeting. Regarding the position of the Board on amalgamation, he said the Board was divided between those who had doubts about the financial viability of an amalgamated organisation and those who felt that potential obstacles were not insurmountable.

She said that the Budget Committee had some difficult decisions to make which included gapping two positions and possibly canceling a national general meeting. She said the committee fully understood the seriousness of such steps given a membership driven organisation such as the Federation. She said the committee rejected increasing delegates fees for general meetings since delegate fee increases make national general meetings inaccessible for some member locals. She said that canceling a general meeting meant making the meeting equally inaccessible for all members, whereas raising delegates fees effected some locals more than others. She said the Budget Committee had a high level of participation and representation, and encouraged the delegates to support the committee's recommendations. She said that the committee had agreed that the figures would be reviewed in November and should the financial situation improve, the priority would be the general meeting and filling the vacant staff positions.

A delegate asked how much money would be saved by cancelling a national general meeting.

Koenen said about \$60,000.00.

Harter noted that a motion calling for the implementation of a binder system for the policy manual and national bylaws had already been adopted.

The Speaker asked the will of plenary to remove 94/05:168 from the table.

Galinger (Trent Central Student Government) said the proposed amendments were intended to ensure that provincial components with no Franocphone members were not being directed to provide interpretation. He said that the motion represented an affirmation that the Federation supported bilingualism. He said the money must be found to comply with the policy.

A delegate said he understood the difficulties for unilingual delegates participating in committees, but said that members should seriously consider the extremely high costs of simultaneous and consecutive interpretation for all aspects of the national general meeting. He said that other avenues should be explored to provide interpretation

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resources for unilingual delegates. He reminded delegates that meetings were only one part of the work of the Federation.

St. Pierre, a representative of the unionised staff, explained that providing interpretation during committee time was not part of the job description of Federation staff.

DEFEATED due to lack of seconder

A delegate said he did not believe that some anglophone members did not fully appreciate the situation that some Francophone students in certain situations. He said there are some words are difficult to interpret for people who are not trained interpreters. He said that as a consequence, Francophones find themselves five minutes behind the discussion. He said they cannot participate in the discussion easily, because by the time they grasp the debate, and formulated their thoughts, the subject or the motion has passed. He said it is very frustrating for Francophones as they are constantly being assimilated, and surrounded by Anglophones. He said Francophones are still a minority and while it may be expensive it would be much more efficient for Francophones to have access to simultaneous interpretation. He said he himself knows enough English that he can get by, but when committees meet late it becomes more exhausting and more of a struggle to keep up. He asked delegates to support the motion despite the costs.

A delegate said she supported the motion and that the crux of the issue was whether the Federation was prepared to provide all of its members the opportunity to participate in the decision making process.

94/05:168 CARRIED

Clarke (Simon Fraser Student Society) stood on a point of personal privileg asking why the National Executive was shutting down debate in the organisation, especially with respect to the budget.

Koenen said that in her introduction to the report, she had urged delegates to support the committee's recommendations. She said she did not consider it practical to re-open the figures in the budget on the floor of plenary, since the Budget Committee was designed to go through that process. She said she is more than willing to respond to any questions. She said that when the question on the budget was called, there were no speakers lined up at the microphone to speak. She said she herself did not call the question but rather plenary did. She also said that the National Executive did not vote to move to the question, but the majority of the members voting at the time had voted to move to the question. She said she could not understand why the National Executive was being blamed for shutting down debate. She said it is the plenary that decides how much debate is undertaken and the plenary is free extend the speakers list, or call the question as they see fit. She said regarding the timeliness of the Budget Committee Report, she said that the budget is one of the lengthier reports to produce, translate and photocopy. She said there was little that could be done to hasten translation time and photocopying time. She said she never suggested that people were not allowed to ask questions or debate, rather, she presented the report and had confidence in the recommendations that were made by the committee as a whole.

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The Speaker said that when the speakers list is exhausted, the question can be called. She said a vote was taken to call the question and such votes must be adopted by a two-thirds majority of the members. The Speaker said she would not entertain any more debate on this issue unless a motion to reconsider were put on the floor.

A delegate stood on a point of order, noting that it was neither the National Executive nor the Speaker who stifled debate but rather the voting members of the plenary. She said if anyone is out of order, it was the plenary.

Harter said he just wanted to know why the National Treasurer did not take more time to present the budget line by line.

Koenen said she would be happy to review the budget line by line. She said that at the time she did not think that the members wanted her to go through the budget line by line. She said she assumed that the members of Budget Committee would report back to those constituencies, caucuses and components that they were representing. She said she is always happy to take questions and would have answered any that were put forward at the time, had any been asked.

Galinger said the Constituency Group Commissioner Chairperson had yet to be ratified.

Clarke (National Executive) said he had hoped to have a question and answer period regarding the membership issues he had outlined earlier.

Crowley said that the McGill Post-Graduate Student Society withdrew motion 95/05:229.

She said that the person who had been elected to the non-voting National Executive representative did not resign but put themselves forward for another voting position on the National Executive.

Salemy said he had been elected as the Constituency Commission National Executive representative but subsequently resigned, and was then elected as the Students of Colour Representative on the National Executive.

A delegate said he opposed the motion because the person in question assumed a position with the intention of resigning in favour of another position.
